Chair Thomson inquired if there was an issue with the Rogers outage in July 2022.

Chief Ambrose commented that all OSPS services are redundant through service providers there was no downtime for communications. There was a downtime of about one hour with internal communications (cell phones) but was quickly remedied by purchasing SIM cards from a competitor as internal communications are with Rogers.

14. Financial Reports from the Chief of Police

a) Financials

Chief Ambrose reviewed the financials ending August 31, 2022 and noted that the OSPS budget is below our 1.95% year-to-date target. Chief Ambrose and the Board Chair met with Kate Allen from the City to review the most recent budget forecast to year end. The 2022 budget is on track and is to be within 1%, with a small variance of just under \$80,000. Chief Ambrose highlighted that there is an overage in OT wages due to staffing, and COVID issues. Court costs have been a marginally higher as four new employees have been hired and trained. With courts opening back up the increase in salaries will be put into the 2023 budget.

As there were no requests for action in any of the above reports and were provided for information purposes, they will be placed on file with the minutes of this meeting for future reference.

Chief Ambrose provided an update on the service’s procedure review with D. Preston. They started out to review 234 policies and are down to the last 4 procedures to go through. Once completed D. Preston will move on to the board’s by-laws/policies.

On August 16th, 2022 I went AWOL from GBHS and Constable Nathan Curry was the one who located me near the runners den, he treated me with kindness and compassion (like he always does) and made sure to acknowledge and validate the feelings and emotions that I was going through at the moment. He takes the oath to serve and protect seriously and has true passion in his heart.

On September 1st 2022 I was dealing with extreme suicidal thoughts/ ideation and PTSD flashbacks. The crisis line phoned police and Constable Josh Gurney attended my residents the words and way he spoke to me truly showed that my life does matter and people care and I personally feel like if he didn't say the stuff he did or act the way he did I might not be here today. He helped ease my anxiety at the hospital when I was panicking and stressing and that helped so much to calm me down.

These are 2 officers that we want in our community and attending mental health related calls when MMHART isn't available as they know not only what to say but how to de escalate a situation properly and effectively without making the mental health individual feel worse.

Criminal Investigations Branch and Drug Enforcement Unit **June, 2022**

Date: July 4th , 2022

Assault Bodily Harm/Stabbing (June 1st) Police responded to a request for assistance at a downtown rooming house and found the victim to have suffered a puncture wound to the neck. The investigation revealed that a verbal dispute between two adult males who were known to each other escalated into a physical fight. During the fight the accused stabbed the victim with an unknown object. The victim was treated at GBHS. The accused, who was also currently wanted on a probation warrant, was located and arrested later on the same day. The accused and was charged with Assault Bodily Harm, Assault with a Weapon, Weapons Dangerous and Breach of Probation x2.

Fraud (June 14th) Police were notified of a potential fraud over \$5000 investigation being reported by a family member. It was believed that the family member had befriended a Port Elgin resident who had defrauded them of nearly \$30,000 as an investment into their hair dressing business. The investigation determined that the fraud did not occur as reported and the matter was referred to civil court to recover any lost money.

Fraud (June 14th) Police were notified of a potential fraud involving a vulnerable elderly person by the Ontario Disability Support Program. The female suspect befriended the vulnerable person after his wife had passed away. Since that time his bank accounts have been accessed and roughly \$27,000 has been taken from his bank account. This investigation is ongoing.

Child Pornography (June 15th) Police were notified by a community support worker that a young female client is believed to have been taken advantage of and nude images may have been distributed. Rapport is being built with the victim with the hope of obtaining additional information to further the investigation.

Mischief (June 16th) City Officials notified Police of ongoing acts of graffiti at the Agricultural Society Barn located at Victoria Park. In response, members of the Criminal Investigations Branch and the Community Oriented Response & Enforcement Unit installed a covert camera in the area which captured three youths as they committed a mischief on June 24th. The youths have been identified by the CORE unit and the investigation is ongoing.

Sexual Assault (July 4th, 2022) CIB investigators commenced a historical assault investigation involving victim 92-year-old tenant of Lee Manor who alleged being sexually assaulted by a retired physician. Investigation is ongoing at this time.

Sexual Interference (July 18th, 2022) CIB investigators commenced a Sexual Interference investigation after a third-party complaint was received. It was alleged that a 15-year-old female had engaged in sexual intercourse with a 28-year-old male. The victim and a witness were interviewed by police and the investigation is ongoing at this time.

Sudden Death (July 21st, 2022) CIB investigated the sudden death of a 38-year-old female who had driven her car into Georgian Bay. CIB maintained the scene while the OPP Underwater Search and Recovery team assisted with body and vehicle recovery. An autopsy was ordered by the coroner which resulted in cause of death being consistent with a drowning.

Child Pornography (July 27th, 2022). CIB commenced a child pornography investigation involving two young females aged 12 and 13 years. The female youths had been communicating, by video chat, with an unknown male over an anonymous online chat website. During the video chat the youths were instructed to take off their clothes and perform certain sexual acts. The unknown male created photos by using a screenshot function on his electronic device. The photos were later sent/shared with the youths Instagram contact list when they would not send more nude photos of themselves. The investigation is ongoing with attempts being made to identify the unknown male.

The female suspect befriended the vulnerable person after his wife had passed away. Since that time his bank accounts have been accessed and roughly \$27,000 has been taken from his bank account. The investigation concluded on July 26th, 2022 with the arrest of a 48-year-old female who has been charged with several criminal offences.
- **RM22000297 – Child Pornography** – In June CIB commenced an investigation into the production and distribution of child pornography. Victim and support person unavailable until August for formal interview. In July CIB conducted a consent download of the victim's phone related to evidence of the offence.

Sexual Assault (August 4th, 2022) Police responded to the downtown core with respect to a sexual assault that had occurred along the east harbor wall. The victim, a 16-year-old male had been sexually assaulted by a 62-year-old male who was later identified and arrested by police. The accused was held for a bail hearing.

OIPRD Complaint (August 8th, 2022) D/Sgt. Baker was assigned to investigate an OIPRD complainant that had just been received. Complainant was arrested in March 2020 and claims during his arrest he received injuries. Investigation remains on going.

Drug Offences – Intelligence (August 11th, 2022) Police were contacted by the RCMP in relation to an arrest made by German Authorities regarding the exportation of ecstasy (MDMA). A male from the Netherlands had been arrested and upon his arrests was found to be in possession of a parcel that contained 10 ecstasy pills with a destination address in Owen Sound. The address on the parcel is known to police and the information has been provided to the Drugs/Intelligence Unit of the OSPS.

Sexual Assault (August 11th, 2022) Police received a complaint where a 45-year-old female had been sexually assaulted by a 57-year-old male in a rooming house in the downtown core of Owen Sound. As a result of the investigation, the 57-year-old male was charged with sexual assault and held for a bail hearing.

Luring (August 12th, 2022) Police received an online tip from Cybertips.ca with respect to the online luring of a 12-year-old female by a male believed to be living in the United States. The investigation is on-going at this time.

Utter Threats (August 19th, 2022) Police received a complaint from a Provincial Animal Welfare Services (PAWS) Officer of his life being threatened because of a PAWS investigation. Accused was being held on a mental health involuntary hold at the time and had made numerous threats to kill the PAWS officer. GBHS staff were very

concerned for the PAWS officer's safety and contacted the victim when the accused was released from their care. Accused was arrested on a warrant for Utter Death Threats. A Production Order is currently being sought for medical records that will provide all relevant details of the threats.

Sudden Death (August 25th, 2022) Police, EMS and Fire were dispatched to the East Harbor wall in Owen Sound with respect to an unresponsive 36-year-old male. There was evidence of drug use at the scene and the male was transported to the Grey Bruce Health Services where he was pronounced deceased. The death of the male is believed to be as a result of a drug overdose pending a toxicology report.

Weapons (August 27th 2022) Detective was called in while on call for male who allegedly held a knife to people during a custody dispute. (Same male that rammed the police vehicle and a warrant was issued) Through investigation it is believed that there was no use of any weapon, including a knife, during the custody argument.

Uniform Assistance:

- **Sudden Death** (August 31st, 2022) Criminal Investigations Branch assisted uniform patrol with the sudden death of a 76-year-old man found lying on his kitchen floor by his adult son. The investigation confirmed his death was by natural causes.

Follow Up:

- August 11th, 2022 – Arrest made of 28-year-old Owen Sound man with respect to sexual assault investigation from July, 2022.
- August 18th, 2022 – Interview of victim from Child Pornography investigation. Investigation continues.

In the month of August, 2022, the Auxiliary Unit was active and attended two important community events in addition to patrol ride alongs.

First, along with other members of the Police Service, the Auxiliary attended the M'Wikwedong Sunrise Ceremony at the Reconciliation Garden in Kelso Beach. After the ceremony, the Auxiliary members took to the water and canoed a portion of the Pottawatomi River with youth from our local Indigenous Community.

Later in the month the Auxiliary Unit attended the Salmon Spectacular "Kids Day" where a booth and display was set up in coordination with our Community Services Officer. Auxiliary members had interactive activities and were engaged with the kids and families in attendance.

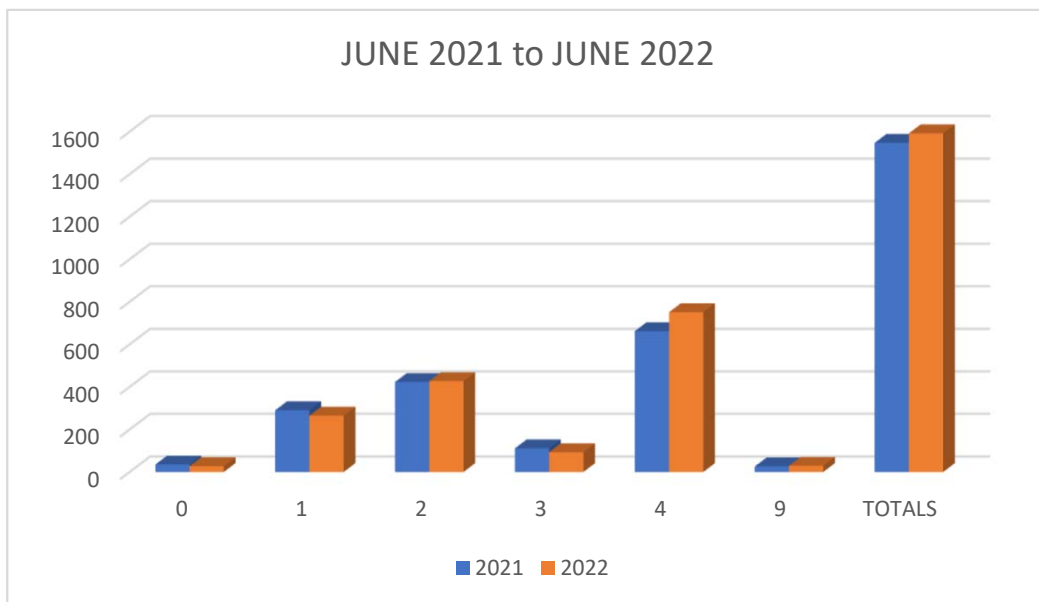

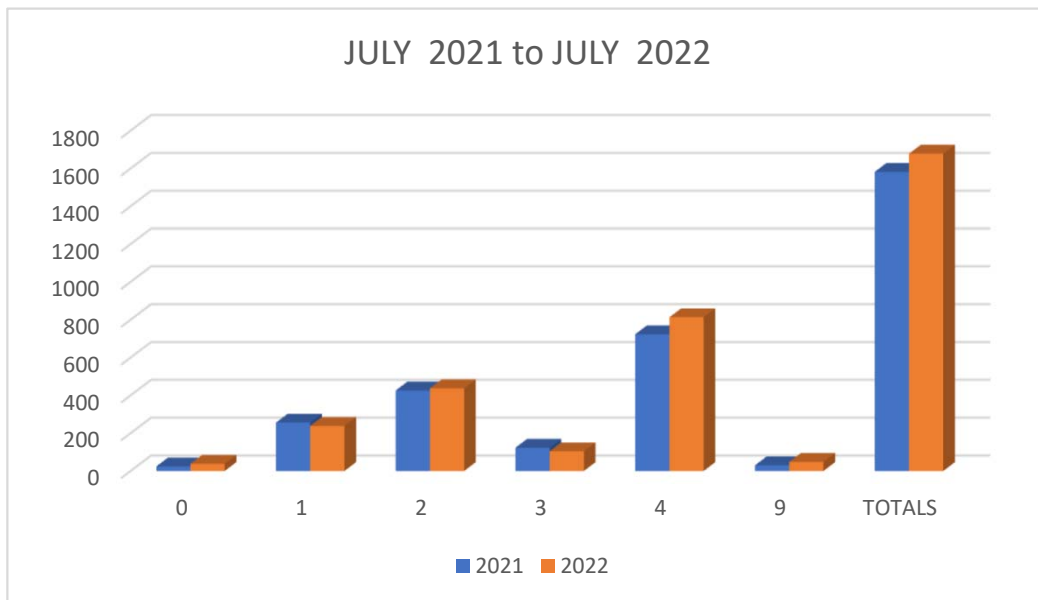

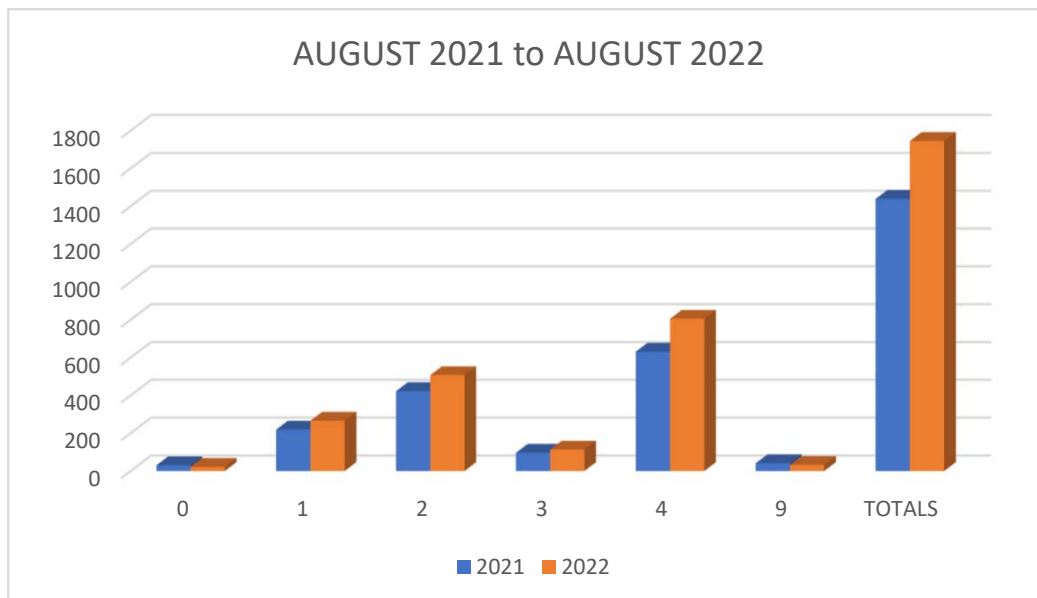

Summary – OSPS IT have been kept busy with expansion of our dispatch map with the addition of 9 fire halls (much of the remainder of Huron County) which has an extremely short launch time of approx. 90 days from bid closing. Mapping projects (aside from our own) are Metrolinx (multi-year project with continuing invoicing) and other OPTIC agency maps. Mapping for other agencies has been slowed down this year due to a large number of OSPS dispatch projects which have taken priority. OSPS IT will be throughout Grey, Bruce and Huron counties for the next two months working on fire department and policing projects.

OSPS IT will be looking to launch NG911 at our backup site as well as conduct a complete security and inventory of assets prior to the end of the year.

Report to the Board: Crime Severity Index and Police Reported Crime Statistics in Canada

On Tuesday, August 2, 2022, Statistics Canada released the 2021 Police-reported Crime Statistics in Canada report.

This report provides numeric comparators that are calculated based on weighted reporting of criminal incidents within jurisdictions in Canada.

Since 1962, Statistics Canada has collected information on all criminal incidents reported by Canadian police services through its annual Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Survey. The UCR information provided, allows for comparisons on police-reported crime across geographies and over time. Crime counts are based on the most serious violation in a criminal incident (primary UCR code). The report provides an analysis of the key statistical trends reported by police in 2021. All measures of the CSI (Crime Severity Index) increased for the fifth consecutive year in Canada.

Owen Sound has a much higher CSI when compared to the Canadian Index overall. Violent crime and non-violent crime are also significantly higher. The overall decrease from 2020 to 2021 in Canada is also mirrored in the city of Owen Sound decrease for the last year. There is a significant drop particularly in violent crime from a ranking of 32nd in 2019 to 54th in 2021 for police services serving a population over 10,000 people. This significant decrease would have been far more drastic had the city not experienced a homicide in 2021 that significantly affected the results. The overall drop in all three rankings from the previous year's ranking shows the drop is more significant in Owen Sound than across Canada.

Crime Severity Index can be affected by many factors. The weighting associated to violent crimes can negatively impact the values for a municipality with a smaller population. Many smaller municipalities have high CSI values compared to larger urban areas where the actual incidents of gun violence and homicide are significantly higher. This makes it difficult to accurately compare the associated values. The CSI does however provide a good barometer of crime in a community especially when comparing similar sized municipalities and examining year to year measures for comparison.

Often Owen Sound is compared to communities of a similar population but as highlighted by the CSI index numbers, the population often doesn't capture the entire picture. Bedroom communities often have low CSI numbers because the majority of the population is absent for a good portion of the day and asleep another portion. Also some comparators have low violent crime indexes and higher nonviolent crime rates affecting their overall CSI.

In summary, the City of Owen Sound continues to be a safe community. Based on the population and the weighting of criminal charges it is difficult to compare the city to all other cities in Canada. The number of reported criminal incidents and crime severity measure decreased in 2022, for the first time in many years. Many of the reported incidents relate to the social determinants of health and cannot be solved by police alone. The re-implementation of a proactive response to calls for service through the Core Team has likely resulted in some of the decrease in the crime severity. Responding to calls for service and reported incidents, the Owen Sound Police Service continue to identify suspects, lay charges and clear crimes at a higher rate than the provincial average.

The majority of the reported incidents are calls for service citizen generated incidents. Police respond after the incident has occurred and investigate and lay charges as appropriate. Laying charges will address the issues once completed but proactive measures and working with community partners to address the issues before an incident occurs is the long term solution to driving down crime in a community. The Core Team, MMHART Team, Community Safety and Wellbeing Tables, and SOS Outreach are examples of the partnerships ongoing within Owen Sound and the Counties that help address these drivers of crime.

Crime Severity Index: Frequently Asked Questions August 2022

What is the Crime Severity Index?

The Crime Severity Index is a measure of police-reported crime that reflects the relative seriousness of individual offences and tracks changes in crime severity. It was first introduced in 2009 and was developed at the request of the policing community to address limitations to the traditional Crime Rate. It is available back to 1998.

It complements two other measures of crime: the police-reported Crime Rate, which measures the volume of crime, and victimization survey data, which measure Canadians' experiences of crime.

In fact, three Crime Severity Indexes exist: one for overall crime, one for violent crime and one for non-violent crime. Other measures available include Indexes for police-reported youth accused and weighted clearance rates.

What are the benefits of having another measure of crime?

The problem of crime in Canada can be viewed through multiple lenses. There is no one measure that can adequately summarize all of the information desired on the extent and characteristics of crime. Different approaches serve different purposes, yet together, they provide a more comprehensive picture of crime than any one approach alone.

The police-reported Crime Rate tells us about the volume of crime coming to the attention of the justice system. It is not a measure of all crime occurring in Canada. But, it adds to our understanding of police workload and demands on the justice system.

The victimization data, for the offence types included, tell us about Canadians' experiences of crime, whether or not they are reported to the police.

The Crime Severity Index provides a different way of looking at crime in Canada. It adds to our understanding of crime because it takes into account the relative seriousness of individual offences.

The Crime Severity Index was introduced to address many of the limitations associated with the traditional police-reported Crime Rate so it provides a clearer picture of trends in crime.

For example, the offences making up the majority of the traditional police-reported Crime Rate are high-volume, less serious offences, such as mischief, minor thefts and disturbing the peace. Due to their high volume, trends in these less serious offences actually drive the trend in the overall police-reported Crime Rate, whereas trends in more serious crimes have less impact on the rate simply because they are less numerous. For example, one incident of homicide is equal to one incident of mischief in terms of the impact on the overall Crime Rate.

For the Crime Severity Index, each crime is assigned a weight depending on its seriousness and as such, serious crimes have more impact on fluctuations in the Index. For instance, weights used in the Crime Severity Index range from 6 for gaming and betting to over 7,000 for murder.

Victimization surveys have shown us that less serious crimes are less likely to come to the attention of police. Variation in reporting for less serious crimes impacts the comparability of police-reported statistics for jurisdictions. Because less serious crimes have less impact on the Crime Severity Index, its trends are more comparable.

With the Crime Severity Index, we see that serious offences have more impact than they did with the traditional Crime Rate.

For example, in 2016 for the overall Crime Severity Index, break-ins accounted for about onequarter (23%) of the Index, compared with about 7% in the Crime Rate.¹ On the other hand, mischief accounted for about 5% of the Index, instead of 10% in the rate.

In terms of the Violent Crime Severity Index in 2016, robberies accounted for about 22%, rather than just 6% in the Violent Crime Rate. However, common assault accounted for only 9%, instead of 41% in the violent crime rate. Homicide, a very serious and relatively lowvolume offence, accounted for 10% of the Violent Crime Severity Index as opposed to 0.2% of the Violent Crime Rate.

How is the Crime Severity Index calculated and are the weights updated regularly?

The seriousness of each offence is determined by using objective sentencing data from the nation's courts.

Each individual offence is "weighted" according to the severity of the sentences handed down by judges. Sentencing data come from both the adult and youth components of Statistics Canada's Integrated Criminal Court Survey (ICCS). Weights for the Index are based on the average of five years of courts sentencing data and they are updated every five years, using the most recent data available from the courts. It should be noted that outliers (atypically very long and unique sentences for a given offence) are not included in the average.

Weights are updated every five years to reflect recent sentencing practices and to account for any new *Criminal Code* offences. The CSI weights have been updated for the second time in 2018 and are applied back to 2016 data and subsequent data releases moving forward until the next update to the weights. Updated weights are not used to revise historical crime statistics.

The release of 2012 data in 2013 marked the first year of UCR data requiring updated weights. The CSI weights were most recently adjusted in 2018 and applied retroactively to UCR data back to 2016 and are applicable to all subsequent data releases moving forward until the next update to the weights. The 2018 version of the weights are based on court data from 2010/2011 to 2014/2015.

¹ Note that these percentages are based on 2016 unrevised crime statistics as this document was originally distributed prior to the release of revised 2016 and 2017 crime statistics.

To calculate the actual weight for an offence, the incarceration rate for that offence – that is, the percentage of all convictions receiving a jail sentence – is multiplied by the average length of the prison sentence in days.

Incarceration rates and average prison sentences are calculated at the national level using five years of courts data.

For example:

Those weights are then multiplied against the volume of each offence to determine what their impact will be in the Crime Severity Index.

For example:

	Weight		Number of incidents		WEIGHTED TOTAL (Contribution to the Index)
Robbery	523	x	33,304	=	17,417,992
Disturb the peace	10	x	116,978	=	1,169,780

The results are then totaled, and divided by the population. The index is standardized to 100 nationally to facilitate comparisons. The base year is 2006.

In addition, two linkage factors are applied to data that use the updated weights (i.e. 2016 revised data and onwards) to ensure comparability of CSI values using the old and new

weights (similar to the way factors are applied to spending amounts over time to ensure constant, comparable dollars that control for inflation).

What is the impact of the updated weights?

The Crime Severity Index is designed as a measure of the severity of police reported crime. If a change is made to the seriousness of a particular crime, by the introduction of a mandatory minimum sentence or other legislative change, it will and should be reflected in the Crime Index at the next regular revision of weights.

However, the degree to which the Crime Severity Index is affected by new legislation alone is not significant. In order to see a significant impact on the Index, a large change in both the volume of an offence and the weight of an offence would have to occur at the same time.

Due to their volume and severity, the top five contributors to the national Crime Severity Index are breaking and entering, robbery, fraud, mischief and theft \$5,000 or under. With the updated weights, breaking and entering and fraud are contributing more to the overall Crime Severity Index than with the previous weights, and the robbery, mischief and theft \$5,000 and under are contributing less.

For the Violent Crime Severity Index, the top five contributors are robbery, sexual assault level 1, assault level 1, assault level 2, and uttering threats to a person. With the new weights, sexual assault level 1, assault level 1 and assault level 2 all have a greater contribution to the Violent Crime Severity Index than with the previous weights. Both robbery and utter threats have a lesser contribution that with the previous weights.

What can the Crime Severity Index be used for?

The index gives us a different view of crime and allows us to answer questions that were not easily answerable previously, such as: Is police reported crime in Canada more serious than it was last year? Is police reported crime in my jurisdiction more or less serious than in another jurisdiction? Has police reported crime become more serious over time?

What does the Crime Severity Index tell us?

The Crime Severity Index tells us if police reported crime was relatively more or less serious than in previous years. For ease of interpretation, the index is converted to 100 for the base year, which is 2006.

For jurisdictions, the Crime Severity Index is particularly useful in determining if police reported crime has become more or less serious over time, or if police reported crime is more or less serious in one area than another.

An example of how a jurisdiction can compare itself to Canada:

In 2006, Canada's Index is 100. If
Province X has an Index of 113,
Then, compared to Canada overall, Province X's police reported crime is more serious
by 13%.

A jurisdiction can also use the Crime Severity Index to determine if its own police reported crime has become more or less serious over time:

Province X has an Index of 113.
Five years ago, its Index was at 122.
So, crime severity in Province X has decreased by 7% over the past 5 years.

The Crime Severity Index can also be used to compare the level of crime severity in one jurisdiction to the level of crime severity in another jurisdiction, in a given year:

Province X has an Index of 113.
In the same year, Province Y has an Index of 85.
So, crime severity in Province X is 33% higher than in Province Y.

What is the jurisdictional impact of the index?

The value of the index in a given jurisdiction is determined by its mix of crimes; the higher the proportion of serious crimes in a jurisdiction, the higher the index.

Let's say that two jurisdictions, Province A and Province B, have roughly the same populations and number of crimes. These areas will have the same crime rate. Their Index values will differ, however, depending on their mix of crimes. For example, if Province A experiences mostly less-serious, and hence lower-weighted, crimes such as disturbing the peace and mischief, their Index value will be quite low. If Province B experiences mostly serious, higher-weighted offences, such as homicides, break-ins and robberies, their Index value will be higher.

Further, less-serious crimes, such as disturbing the peace and mischief, tend to be subject to reporting differences both by the public and by the police in various jurisdictions. The Crime Severity Index decreases the impact that these less-serious crimes have on trends, thereby improving comparisons among provinces and municipalities.

Who was involved in the development of the Crime Severity Index?

The index was created by the Canadian Centre for Justice and Community Safety Statistics at Statistics Canada in collaboration with numerous engagement partners. Representatives from

provincial and federal justice departments as well as the policing and academic communities sat on a Working Group to guide the development of the Index.

Specifically, the Working Group was made up of members from the following organisations:

- Statistics Canada: CCJCSS UCR Survey and Courts Survey staff, methodologists
- Police Services: RCMP, OPP, Sûreté du Québec, Royal Newfoundland Constabulary, Toronto, Ottawa, Winnipeg, Victoria and Saint John
- Federal/provincial Justice Liaison Officers: Justice Canada, New Brunswick, Quebec, Ontario and Alberta
- Academics: Universities of Ottawa, Waterloo and Manitoba

Do the weights take into consideration “time served” in remand?

The length of time served in remand is not available from the Courts Survey, and therefore cannot be accounted for in the Crime Index weights. However, it is known to be a factor in sentencing.

BY-LAW NO. 2008-03

A BY-LAW OF THE OWEN SOUND POLICE SERVICES BOARD RESPECTING THE LICENCING, GOVERNING, REGULATING AND INSPECTING OF ADULT ENTERTAINMENT PARLOURS AND ATTENDANTS, AS DEFINED IN THIS BY-LAW.

WHEREAS Section 151 of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, S.O.2001, c.25 as amended (the Act) authorizes a Municipal Council to pass By-laws for the licencing, regulating, governing, classifying and inspecting of adult entertainment establishments including adult entertainment parlours and Attendants as defined in this By-law and for revoking or suspending any such licence and for limiting the number of licences to be granted;

AND WHEREAS pursuant to Section 159(1) of the Act the City Council with the consent of the Owen Sound Police Services Board passed By-law 2004-023 on the 23rd day of February, 2004 which delegated to the Owen Sound Police Services Board the power to licence, regulate, and govern adult entertainment parlours and Attendants, in the City, together with other establishments named therein;

AND WHEREAS Section 159(2) of the Act provides that Part IV of the Act dealing with licencing of these matters thereafter applies with necessary modifications to a Police Services Board to which these powers have been delegated;

AND WHEREAS the Owen Sound Police Services Board deems it necessary to exercise its licencing powers under Section 150 and Section 151 of the Act including imposing conditions for the following purposes:

- i) the health and safety of the inhabitants of the City of Owen Sound; and
- ii) to control, regulate and govern activities as described in the By-law which might be, or might become, a nuisance

AND WHEREAS the reason the Owen Sound Police Services Board is licencing the activities described herein, or imposing the conditions described herein which apply to the business described herein, is that an adult entertainment parlour, where goods, entertainments or services that are designed to appeal to erotic or sexual appetites or inclinations are provided in the premises or part of the premises, or any activities described in the By-law are carried on, involve activities which do affect, or can affect, the health and safety of the inhabitants of the City of Owen Sound, and the conditions set out in this By-law for the licencing of adult entertainment parlours and

attendants, including without limitation the owner or operator and any attendant or other person performing services in the adult entertainment parlour, and also required to be licenced by this By-law, are included for the purpose of protecting the health and safety of the inhabitants of the City of Owen Sound, as well as to regulate, govern, and control activities which are, or might become, a nuisance. Public health and safety are protected by controlling and regulating the physical conditions of the location of the adult entertainment parlour, including the activities to be carried on therein, attendant and other employee standards, and similar conditions, in order to protect the inhabitants of the City of Owen Sound. The location of the adult entertainment parlour should be licenced and regulated to ensure that the use does not become a nuisance in the area in terms of exterior appearance, signage, noise, parking, vehicular and pedestrian access, and to ensure that the number and concentration of such uses do not adversely impact on surrounding land uses, and the inhabitants of the City of Owen Sound.

NOW THEREFORE the Owen Sound Police Services Board hereby enacts as follows:

1. DEFINITIONS

For purposes of this By-law:

- 1.1 **"adult entertainment parlour"** is an adult entertainment establishment, where any premises or any part of them, includes, in pursuance of the business carried on in those premises, goods, entertainment or services that are designed to appeal to erotic or sexual appetites or inclinations;
- 1.2 **"Board"** means the Owen Sound Police Services Board.
- 1.3 **"applicant"** means the person applying for a licence pursuant to this By-law.
- 1.4 **"attendant"** means any person other than a licenced owner or operator who provides services appealing to or designed to appeal to erotic or sexual appetites or inclinations in an Adult Entertainment Parlour;
- 1.5 **"business"** includes a trade or occupation;
- 1.6 **"Chief of Police"** shall mean the person being the Chief of Police pursuant to the Police Services Act of Ontario, holding the position of Chief of Police for the City of Owen Sound from time to time; where this By-law refers to the Chief of Police carrying out any of the duties set out in this By-law, the term "Chief of Police" shall include any person including a police officer designated by the Chief of Police to carry out those duties in the absence of the Chief of Police;
- 1.7 **"City"** shall mean The Corporation of the City of Owen Sound.
- 1.8 **"Council"** shall mean the Municipal Council for The Corporation of the City of Owen Sound;
- 1.9 **"customer"** includes any person seeking or soliciting, or to whom is provided or offered, services at an adult entertainment parlour;
- 1.10 **"he or she"** or **"him or her"** and **"his or her"** shall be deemed to include reference to corporations and partnerships as the context allows, including **"it"**, and **"its"** as the case may be;
- 1.11 **"licence"** means an authorization under this By-law to carry on the business specified herein, and the document providing evidence of such authorization, as the context may allow;
- 1.12 **"licenced"** means licenced under this By-law and not in breach of the provisions of this By-law;
- 1.13 **"Official"** includes a person authorized by the Chief of Police to carry out duties under the By-law;
- 1.14 **"operator"** means a person who, alone or with others, operates, manages, supervises, runs or controls an Adult Entertainment Parlour;
- 1.15 **"operator's licence"** means a valid and subsisting Licence issued under this By-law to an Operator as defined in this section;
- 1.16 **"owner"** means a person who will own or with others has the right to possess or occupy an adult entertainment parlour business or who actually does possess or occupy an adult

entertainment parlour business, and includes a Lessee of an adult entertainment parlour business or premises upon which an adult entertainment parlour business is located, and includes an owner/operator;

- 1.17 **“owner’s licence”** means a valid and subsisting licence issued under this By-law to an owner as defined in this section;
- 1.18 **“person”** includes a natural individual, his/her heirs, executors, administrators or other legal representatives, and a corporation, partnership or other form of business association, or a receiver or mortgagee in possession;
- 1.19 **“Police Officer”** shall mean a police officer for The Corporation of the City of Owen Sound;
- 1.20 **“services”** includes activities, facilities, performances, exhibitions, viewing and encounters but does not include the exhibition of film approved under the Theatres Act;
- 1.21 **“services appealing to or designed to appeal to erotic or sexual appetites or inclinations”** shall include:
- a) services of which a principal feature or characteristic is the nudity or partial nudity of any person. For the purposes of this clause “partial nudity” shall mean less than completely and opaquely covered:
 - i) human genitals or human pubic region;
 - ii) human buttocks; or,
 - iii) female breast below a point immediately above the top of the areola.
 - b) services in respect of which the word **“nude”**, **“naked”**, **“topless”**, **“bottomless”**, **“sexy”** or any other word or any picture, symbol or representation having like meaning or implication is used in any advertisement.
- 1.22 **“to provide”** when used in relation to services includes to furnish, perform, solicit or give such services in pursuance of a trade, calling, business or occupation and **“providing”**, **“provided”** and **“provision”** have corresponding meanings.

2. LICENCES

- 2.1 Every owner, every operator and every attendant of an adult entertainment parlour shall apply for a licence from the Board authorizing them respectively to carry on their respective trade, calling, business, and/or occupation within the City and shall pay to the Board at the time of applying for such licence the fee established in Schedule "B" attached to this By-law.
- 2.1.2 Notwithstanding the provision herein concerning fees, the Board may require the holder of any licence issued pursuant to this By-law to pay additional fees at any time during the term of the licence for costs incurred by the Board attributable to the activities of the licence holder.
- 2.1.3 Non-payment by the licence holder of the additional fees imposed pursuant to s.2.1.2 hereof shall entitle the Chief of Police to revoke the licence of the licence holder owing said fees.
- 2.2 No person shall own or operate an adult entertainment parlour in the City without first being licenced under this By-law and thereafter maintaining the licence in good standing.
- 2.3 No person shall provide the services of an attendant in the City without first being licenced under this By-law and thereafter keeping the licence in good standing.
- 2.4 A separate owner's licence pursuant to this By-law shall be required for each adult entertainment parlour.
- 2.5 No owner of an adult entertainment parlour shall permit any person other than an operator licenced under this By-law to operate such adult entertainment parlour.
- 2.6 No owner or operator shall permit the provision of services upon, in or at his/her adult entertainment parlour by any person other than an attendant licenced under this By-law.
- 2.7 No attendant or other person shall provide services in any adult entertainment parlour unless the owner of such adult entertainment parlour and the operator is licenced as an owner or operator respectively under this By-law;

- 2.8 No operator, not being the owner of an adult entertainment parlour, shall operate the said adult entertainment parlour unless the owner of the said adult entertainment parlour is licenced as an owner under this By-law.
- 2.9 No operator shall operate any adult entertainment parlour unless he/she first notifies the Chief of Police of the name of the owner whose adult entertainment parlour he/she intends to operate and has endorsed upon his/her licence the said owner's name accordingly.
- 2.10 A licence issued under this By-law is in force as follows:
- 2.10.1 Owner's Licence: Two years from date of issue
- 2.10.2 Operator's Licence: Two years from date of issue
- 2.10.3 Attendant's Licence: Two years from Date of Issue
- 2.11 If an Owner or Operator ceases to be an Owner or Operator as defined herein, he or she shall report the same to, and shall surrender his or her licence to, the Chief of Police, within seven days thereof, and his or her licence shall be deemed to be revoked, provided that, the licence of any such Owner or Operator who ceases for any reason to be the same, shall be deemed to be revoked notwithstanding his or her failure to report the same to, and to deliver the said licence to, the Chief of Police.
- 2.12 Notwithstanding the provisions herein concerning fees, the Board may require the holder of any licence issued pursuant to this By-law to pay additional fees at any time during the term of the licence for costs incurred by the Board attributable to the activities of the licence holder.
- 2.13 Non-payment by the licence holder of the additional fees imposed pursuant to s. 2.12 hereof shall entitle the Chief of Police to revoke the licence of the licence holder owing said fees, subject to the right to a hearing pursuant to this By-law.

3. APPLICATIONS

- 3.1 On every application for an owner's, operator's, or attendant's licence or for the renewal thereof, the applicant shall attend in person at the office of the Chief of Police and shall complete the prescribed forms and shall furnish to the Chief of Police such information as set out in Schedule "A" attached to this By-law and shall provide to the Chief of Police all other items and matters required by the provisions of this By-law, as amended
- 3.2 In addition to the information required by Section 3.1 hereof, an applicant for an owner's licence for an adult entertainment parlour, shall provide to the Chief of Police, the following:
- 3.2.1 a floor plan for the adult entertainment parlour drawn to scale;
- 3.2.2 a certificate signed by the Fire Chief or Fire Prevention Officer certifying that he/she has inspected the premises in respect of which the application is made, and confirming compliance with fire regulations;
- 3.2.3 a certificate dated within three months of the application signed by the local inspector of Ontario Hydro certifying that the electric wiring has been inspected and found to be in compliance with the regulations;
- 3.2.4 a certificate signed by the Medical Officer of Health certifying that he/she has inspected the premises in respect of which the application is made and confirming compliance with the regulations;
- 3.2.5 a certificate from the Chief Building Official for the City confirming that the premises comply with the regulations;
- 3.2.6 the licence fee or fees hereinbefore set out in the Adult Entertainment Fees By-law.
- 3.3 In addition to the information required by Sections 3.1 and 3.2 hereof, an applicant for a licence under this By-law shall provide the following:
- 3.3.1 for an owner's licence, a certificate signed by the Chief of Police certifying that he/she has caused to be inspected, the premises in respect of which the application is made and setting out his/her opinion as to the suitability of the use proposed;
- 3.3.2 for an owner's, operator's, or attendant's licence, a certificate signed by the Chief of Police

stating the opinion of the Chief of Police as to:

- 3.3.2.1 The items set out in Section 8.1 hereof including the matter referred to in subparagraphs 8.1.1, 8.1.2, 8.1.3, 8.1.4, 8.1.5, 8.1.6, and 8.1.7.
- 3.3.2.2 The Certificate signed by the Chief of Police required by paragraphs 3.3.1 and 3.3.2 shall be in the form set out on Schedule "C" which is attached hereto.
- 3.4 Where the applicant is a Corporation or a partnership the person attending at the office of the Chief of Police pursuant to Section 3.1 shall be an officer or director of the Corporation or one of the partners in the partnership.
- 3.5.1 (a) Every person applying for an Owner's, Operator's or Attendant's Licence or Renewal thereof shall submit to the Chief of Police either
- i) his/her valid driver's licence including thereon an up-to-date photograph and identification particulars; or
 - ii) his/her valid provincial Age of Majority card, or equivalent, including thereon an up-to-date photograph and identification particulars; or
 - iii) his/her valid and complete passport; or
 - iv) as an alternative to the items described in items i), ii) or iii) of this subparagraph, the Applicant shall submit his/her fingerprints to the Chief of Police;
- (b) Where a Corporation or Partnership is to be licenced hereunder, the items mentioned in item (a) 1), ii), iii) of this subparagraph, the fingerprints mentioned in subparagraph (a) iv), and the passport size photographs mentioned in subparagraph (b) shall be that of the person who signs the Application form.
- 3.5.2 Where the owner or operator is a Corporation, the person who, on behalf of the Corporation, signs the application for an owner's or operator's licence shall comply with the requirements of Section 3.5.1.
- 3.5.3 Where the owner or operator is a partnership, the person who signs the application on behalf of the partnership shall comply with the requirements of Section 3.5.1.
- 3.6 Every person applying for a licence must use his/her own legal name in making application, and subject to Section 3.7, no licence shall be issued to any person in any name other than his/her own legal name.
- 3.7 Every owner, operator or attendant intending to use a name or designation other than his/her own may, at the time of issue of the licence or at the time at which he/she files with the Chief of Police notice of intention to use such name or designation, have endorsed on the licence such name or designation.
- 3.8 Every person applying for an owner's licence shall file with the Chief of Police, documentation demonstrating the applicant's right to possess or occupy the premises used by him/her as an adult entertainment parlour, and if such person is not the registered owner or owner in fee simple of the property in which the adult entertainment parlour is located, such person shall file with the Chief of Police at the same time, a copy of his/her lease, if any, or other document constituting the legal relationship between the said applicant and the registered owner or owner in fee simple of the property.
- 3.9 Every owner, operator, or attendant licenced under this By-law who changes his/her permanent residence, shall, within two (2) days after such change, attend at the office of the Chief of Police and shall notify the Chief of Police of such change of address and shall produce proof of his/her new address and shall produce his/her owner's, operator's and/or attendant's licence for the change to be endorsed therein.
- 3.10 No person shall make a false or intentionally misleading recital of facts, statement or representation in any application for licence under this By-law.
- 3.11 No person shall be licenced under this By-law unless he or she is eighteen (18) years of age or over, and a citizen of Canada or a landed immigrant or in possession of and produces a work permit issued by the Government of Canada.

- 3.12 If the Applicant for a Licence is a Corporation or Partnership, subparagraphs 3.11 hereof shall apply to the partner, shareholder, officer or director who applies on behalf of the Corporation or Partnership.
- 3.13 The Chief of Police of the City shall:
- (a) receive and process all Applications for Licences and for renewals of Licences to be issued under this By-law;
 - (b) issue to all applicants with respect to all Applications a Certificate in the form set out on Schedule "C" attached hereto forming part of this By-law;
 - (c) carry out such searches, investigation or verification relating to the Application as he/she deems necessary for the purposes of the administration of this By-law, and shall, if the investigation or any other information available to him/her discloses no reasonable grounds to believe that the Application is not in compliance with this By-law, or that the Applicant may not be entitled to the issuance of a licence on the grounds referred to in this By-law, or by any other applicable law,
 - i) issue an Interim Attendant's Licence to the Applicant who requests the same;
 - ii) issue a Licence or renewal thereof to an Owner, Operator, or Attendant;
 - (d) enforce the provisions of this By-law;
 - (e) perform the administrative functions conferred upon him/her by this By-law, and sign all approved Licences or renewals thereof, including Interim Attendant's Licences.
- 3.14 When necessary, the Chief of Police may appoint as his/her appointee another police officer who shall perform the duties of the Chief of Police pursuant to this By-law.
- 3.15 A licence issued pursuant to this By-law shall be in the form from time to time approved by Resolution or By-law of the Board.
- 3.16 Notwithstanding the provision hereof, where an Attendant applies for a Licence, and appears, based on the material provided with the Application for Licence, to meet the requirements of this By-law, notwithstanding that the Chief of Police has not received responses to all investigations or inquiries made by him/her relating to the Application, so as to enable the Chief of Police to issue an Attendant's Licence to the Applicant, if the Applicant requires the same pending approval, or refusal of the Application, the Chief of Police may issue to the Applicant an Interim Attendant's Licence which shall permit the Applicant on a temporary basis, to provide the services of an Attendant, pending either the cancellation by the Chief of Police of the Interim Attendant's Licence as provided herein, or the issuing or refusal of the Attendant's Licence in accordance with the provisions of the By-law.
- 3.17 If after the issuance by the Chief of Police of an Interim Attendant's Licence, information becomes available to the Chief of Police which indicates to the Chief of Police that the Applicant has not met all requirements of this By-law, or that the Chief of Police will be recommending to the Board that the Application for an Attendant's Licence be refused by the Board, then the Chief of Police may cancel the Interim Attendant's Licence by issuing a written Notice so stating, including a statement as to why it appears the Applicant has not met the requirements of the By-law, or why the Chief of Police will be recommending to the Board that the Application for an Attendant's Licence be refused, and the Notice and Statement shall be served by personal service or prepaid mail on the Applicant, who shall forthwith deliver up to the Chief of Police the Interim Attendant's Licence which has been cancelled and upon the said personal service occurring, or 48 hours after mailing the Notice to the Applicant's address as set out on the Application, the said Interim Attendant's Licence shall thereafter be null and void.
- 3.18 If the Chief of Police cancels an Interim Attendant's Licence in accordance with subparagraph 3.17 hereof, the Chief of Police shall inform the Board of the same, including a statement to the Board as to why the Applicant has not met the requirements of the By-law, and the Chief of Police and the Board will thereafter deal with the Application in accordance with the provisions of this By-law.
- 3.19 If after issuing an Interim Attendant's Licence, the Chief of Police approves the Application for Attendant's Licence, the Interim Attendant's Licence received by the

Attendant from the Chief of Police shall be deemed to be an Attendant's Licence as provided herein.

- 3.20 Where the investigation by the Chief of Police, or any other information available to the Chief, discloses to the Chief of Police reasonable grounds to believe that the Applicant for, or Licencee named in, any licence required by this By-law, may have his/her Application refused, or Licence revoked, for any of the grounds set out in this By-law, the Chief of Police shall so inform the Board and the Chief of Police shall recommend to the Board that it should refuse to issue or renew the Licence or that the Board should suspend or revoke the Licence, or issue the Licence on terms and conditions.
- 3.21 Before the Board refuses to issue or refuses to renew a Licence or suspends or revokes a Licence, a written Notice advising the Applicant or Licencee of the recommendation being made by the Chief of Police to the Board with respect to the Licence, or any other grounds provided in this By-law for the possible refusal, suspension or revocation of the Licence by the Board, shall be given to the Applicant or the Licencee by the Chief of Police, by personal service, or by sending the same by prepaid mail to the address of the Applicant as shown on the Application form; service by prepaid mail shall be deemed to be received by the addressee 48 hours after the mailing thereof.
- 3.22 The written Notice to be given under subparagraph 3.21 shall:
- (a) set out the grounds for the recommendation;
 - (b) give reasonable particulars of the grounds;
 - (c) be signed by the Chief of Police;
 - (d) inform the Applicant or Licencee that, before the Board renders a decision on the matter, the Applicant is entitled to a hearing before the Board if he/she delivers to the City Clerk within seven days after the date of service of the written Notice a written request for a hearing before the Board; and
 - (e) inform the Applicant or Licencee of the provisions of subparagraphs 3.25 and 3.26 of this By-law.
- 3.23 Where the Chief of Police receives notice from an Applicant requiring a hearing in compliance with this paragraph, the Chief of Police shall refer the Application and related information to the Board for a hearing.
- 3.24 The relevant provisions of the Statutory Powers Procedure Act of Ontario, as amended, shall apply to all hearings conducted by the Board under this By-law.
- 3.25 When the Applicant or Licencee who has been given written Notice of the Hearing does not attend at the appointed time and place, the Board may treat the Application as being abandoned, and the Application need not be processed further, or the Board may proceed with the Hearing in his/her absence and the Applicant or Licencee shall not be entitled to any further notice of the proceedings.
- 3.26 The Board shall, after the hearing, make its decision on the matter, and the Applicant or Licencee shall not be entitled to a further hearing on the matter before the Board, and the decision of the Board shall be final.

4. SALE OR TRANSFER OF ADULT ENTERTAINMENT PARLOUR

- 4.1 No owner's licence shall be transferred and if an owner sells, leases or otherwise disposes of his/her adult entertainment parlour or the premises or part thereof upon or in which an adult entertainment parlour is operated, his/her licence in respect of such adult entertainment parlour or premise shall, notwithstanding any other provision of this By-law, be terminated.
- 4.2 Subject to the provisions of this By-law, the Chief of Police may issue a new owner's licence to the purchaser, lessee, or other person obtaining an interest in an adult entertainment parlour or the premises, or part thereof, upon or in which the adult entertainment parlour has been operated subject also to the following conditions:
- 4.2.1 that the new applicant, qualify under all of the other provisions of the By-law and that he/she comply with the requirements of this By-law relating to him/her;
- 4.2.2 that the new applicant file with the Chief of Police an executed copy of the written agreement

between the applicant and the vendor containing all of the details of the dealings between the parties in respect of such adult entertainment parlour or premises.

- 4.3 Upon the sale, lease or other disposition of an adult entertainment parlour, every owner's licence issued in respect of such entertainment parlour shall terminate, and the Chief of Police may, subject to the provisions of the By-law, issue the purchaser, lessee or other person obtaining an interest in such adult entertainment parlour a new owner's licence in respect of such adult entertainment parlour.

5. AGE RESTRICTION

- 5.1 No owner or operator shall permit any person under the age of eighteen (18) years to enter or remain in any adult entertainment parlour owned or operated by him/her.

6. LOCATION

- 6.1 No licence will be issued or renewed under this By-law unless:
- 6.1.1 the adult entertainment parlour is located on land described on Schedule "C" attached to this By-law; and
- 6.1.2 the applicant is licenced under and by all other statutes, by-laws, codes, regulations and authorities having jurisdiction.
- 6.2 No person shall own or operate an adult entertainment parlour in the City, and no attendant shall perform or provide services in an adult entertainment parlour in the City except in a licenced adult entertainment parlour on the lands described in Schedule "C" attached to this By-law.
- 6.3 No person shall own or operate or cause or permit to be owned or operated an adult entertainment parlour, and no attendant shall provide any services as an adult entertainment parlour attendant, from any premises in the City of Owen Sound except upon such lands as are zoned to expressly permit the use of an adult entertainment parlour thereon, as provided in the Zoning By-law, or any Interim Control By-law, of the City, as amended from time to time.

7. SIGNAGE

- 7.1 No person shall erect or permit to be erected any sign which advertises an adult entertainment parlour except in accordance with the following provisions:
- 7.2 No more than one sign shall be established to advertise an adult entertainment parlour, which sign shall only be permitted on one exterior face of the building within which the adult entertainment parlour is located.
- 7.3 No sign advertising an adult entertainment parlour shall:
- 7.3.1 be located on any lot except the same lot on which the adult entertainment parlour is located;
- 7.3.2 have a sign area exceeding 5.0 square metres;
- 7.3.3 contain any icons, pictures, photographs or other illustrations, and shall contain only readable text which shall not contain any words or slang referring to any part of a human body or the word "nude", "naked", "topless", "bottomless", "sexy" or any other word, picture, symbol or representation having like meaning or implication.
- 7.4 The provisions of the City of Owen Sound Sign By-law shall apply, except that where there is a conflict, the provisions of this by-law shall prevail.
- 7.5 No person shall install, operate, use, or permit to be installed, operated or used any advertising device employing oral or other communication advertising or promoting an adult entertainment parlour, where the oral or other communication emanates from and is audible outside the adult entertainment parlour.

8. GROUND FOR REFUSAL TO LICENCE, RENEW OR REVOKE

- 8.1 An applicant whose application meets all the requirements of this By-law is entitled to a Licence except where the Chief of Police, in its discretion, determines that a licence should

not be issued to the Applicant because:

- 8.1.1 having regard to his/her financial position he/she cannot reasonably be expected to be financially responsible in the conduct of his/her business, or
- 8.1.2 the past or present conduct of the applicant affords reasonable grounds for belief that the issuance of a licence would be adverse to the public interest, or
- 8.1.3 the past or present conduct of the applicant affords reasonable grounds for belief that the person will not carry on or engage in the business in accordance with the law or with honesty and integrity, or
- 8.1.4 the applicant is carrying on activities that are, or will be, if licenced, in contravention of this By-law or any other law, By-law or Statute, or
- 8.1.5. there are reasonable grounds for belief that any application or other document provide to the Chief of Police by or on behalf of the applicant contains a false statement or provides false information,
- 8.1.6. there are reasonable grounds for belief that the building, premises, or place in which the business is carried on or is intended to be carried on does not comply with the provisions of this By-law or any other law, including any applicable building requirements, or is dangerous or unsafe, or
- 8.1.7. the fee payable in respect of the licence applied for has not been paid as per Schedule 'A' of the Adult Entertainment Fees By-law.
- 8.1.8 the Applicant has not paid outstanding fines including any levy pursuant to s.2.12 hereof, owing by the Applicant for a contravention or contraventions of this By-law.
- 8.2 Chief of Police or the Board may refuse to issue a licence or refuse to renew a licence where the applicant is disentitled to a licence under Section 8.1.
- 8.3 Chief of Police or the Board may revoke a licence where the Licencee would be disentitled to a licence if he/she were an applicant under Section 8.1, and any licence fee paid is non-refundable.
- 8.4 Where the Applicant for a Licence pursuant to this By-law is a partnership or a corporation, any conduct of the Applicant being taken into consideration by the Chief of Police or the Board in making its decision on the Application shall include the conduct of any partner in the partnership, or of any director, shareholder or officer of the corporation.
- 8.5 Where any Application for a Licence or Renewal thereof is refused, or where a Licence is revoked, the following applies with respect to Application fees paid:
 - 8.5.1 the Application fee paid for an Attendant's Licence, as set out in Schedule 'A' of the Adult Entertainment Fees By-law, is entirely forfeited to the Board, in order to cover administrative costs relating to processing the Application for the Licence, and
 - 8.5.2 the Application fee for an Operator or Owner's Licence, as set out in Schedule 'A' of the Adult Entertainment Fees By-law, shall be refunded to the Applicant, except for the reasonable costs of processing the Application, which shall be forfeited to the Board. If the Applicant disputes the amount of the processing costs, the amount shall be fixed by the Board in its absolute discretion.

9. INSPECTION

- 9.1 On receipt of an application for a licence or for renewal of a licence, a Police Officer, or other official authorized by the Chief of Police, may, at any reasonable time, enter upon the premises of the applicant or licensee to make an inspection to ensure that all the provisions of this By-law have been satisfied and shall, on completion of his/her inspection, complete and file a written report.
- 9.2 No person shall obstruct a Police Officer, or other authorized official, inspecting premises or withhold, destroy, conceal or refuse to furnish any information or thing required by the Police Officer, or other authorized official, conducting the inspection.
- 9.3 Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Chief of Police or anyone acting under his authority, including any police officer, may, at any time of the day or night enter any adult entertainment parlour required to be licenced, regulated, or governed, by the By-law, whether licenced or not, to determine whether this By-law is being complied with, and for

this purpose may make such examinations, investigations and inquiries as are necessary.

- 9.4 No person shall hinder, obstruct, or attempt to hinder or obstruct, any person carrying out any function or duty provided for in this By-law, including the making of any examinations, investigations or inquiries to determine whether this By-law is being complied with.

10. RETURN OF LICENCE

- 10.1 Where a licence has been revoked, the holder of the licence shall return the licence to the Chief of Police within twenty-four (24) hours of receipt of notification of the revocation failing which the Chief of Police or his/her appointee may enter upon the premises of the holder of the licence for the purpose of receiving or taking the said licence and no person shall refuse to deliver or in any way obstruct or prevent the Chief of Police or his/her appointee from obtaining the licence.

11. PENALTY

- 11.1 Every person who contravenes this By-law, and every director or officer of a corporation who concurs in such contravention by the corporation, is guilty of an Offence or conviction is liable to a fine not exceeding \$25,000.00, or to imprisonment, for a term not exceeding one year, or both;
- 11.2 Despite section 11.1, every corporation who is convicted of an Offence under this By-law is guilty of an Offence, and on conviction is liable to a fine not exceeding \$50,000.00;
- 11.3 Where any Owner is convicted of carrying on or engaging in an Adult Entertainment Parlour without a Licence required by this By-law, the Court shall Order that the premises or part of the premises where the Adult Entertainment Parlour is or was provided be closed to any use for any period not exceeding two years;
- 11.4 Where any person is convicted of a contravention of this By-law, other than an Owner convicted of carrying on or engaging in an Adult Entertainment Parlour without a Licence to do so passed pursuant to this By-law, if the Court is satisfied that the Owner or other person occupying the premises or part thereof in respect of which the conviction was made knew or ought to have known of the conduct which formed the subject matter of the conviction, or of any pattern of similar conduct, the Court may Order that the premises or part thereof be closed for any use for any period not exceeding two years.

12. CONFIDENTIALITY

- 12.1 Every person employed in the administration of this By-law and the attached schedules, including any person making an inspection under Sections 3 and 9, shall preserve secrecy and respect of all matters that come to his/her knowledge in the course of his/her duties, employment or inspection and shall not communicate any such matters to any other person, except as may be required in the course of administration or in any proceedings under the By-law and annexed schedules:
- 12.1.1 to the Chief of Police or the Board;
- 12.1.2 to legal Counsel of any person employed in the administration of this By-law;
- 12.1.3 with the consent of the person to whom the information relates, any other person; or
- 12.1.4 any accreditable police agency requesting such information.

13. GENERAL

- 13.1 The number of owner's licences which may be in force at one time in the City in respect of adult entertainment parlours shall be limited to two licences maximum.
- 13.2 Any owner's licence issued pursuant to this By-law shall relate only to the premises expressly referred to therein, and if an adult entertainment parlour fails to commence operations within six (6) months of the licence referring to the same being issued, or if any licenced adult entertainment parlour ceases to provide services as defined in Sections 1.11 and 1.20 hereof for a six (6) month period, the said licence may be revoked by the Board.
- 13.3 If any provision or requirement of this By-law or the application thereof to any person shall to any extent be held to be invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this By-law or the application of such provision or requirement to all persons other than those relating to which it is held to be invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected thereby and each provision and

requirement of this By-law shall be separately valid and enforceable to the fullest extent permitted by law.

- 13.4 Where this By-law provides for a specified official of the Board, or other public agency, to carry out any actions, the action may be carried out by another official who is authorized to carry out the duties of the said official in his/her absence.
- 13.5 This By-law shall be read with all changes of gender or number as are required by the circumstances and the context.
- 13.6 This By-law shall come into full force and take effect on the date of final passing.
- 13.7 For the purpose of a prosecution or proceeding under the By-law, the holding out to the public that the entertainment or services as defined in s. 1 hereof are provided in the premises or any part of them which premises are the subject matter of the prosecution or proceeding, is admissible in evidence as proof, in the absence of evidence to the contrary, that the premises or part of them is an adult entertainment parlour.
- 13.8 Schedules “A” to “C” inclusive attached hereto form part of this By-law
