

December 14 CSC Engagement Outcome

- 30 draft recommendations presented to CSC on December 14, 2022.
- Dotmocracy exercise to indicate support or don't support each recommendation.
- 24 of 30 recommendations were supported.
- Five recommendations received support without a large majority.
- One recommendation was not supported.
