#### **RE: Municipal Codes of Conduct**

Ethical behaviour and respectful civil discourse are fundamental to maintaining public respect for our democratic institutions. When the behaviour of elected representatives falls short, democracy suffers. That is why I am writing to you to urge introduction of legislation to update municipal Codes of Conduct and improve enforcement.

In recent years, incidents of disrespectful, uncivil, and egregious conduct by some municipal council members have occurred that have clearly concerned the public, municipal staff, and elected members of councils. Without adequate tools to enforce compliance with our Codes of Conduct and to discipline members found to have violated them, municipal councils have found themselves unable to meet public expectations.

Ontario's citizens deserve better. In 2021, AMO supplied strong recommendations to the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, the Honourable Steve Clark to enhance municipal Codes of Conduct and compliance by:

- Updating municipal Codes of Conduct to account for workplace safety and harassment
- Creating a flexible administrative penalty regime that can be adapted to the local economic and financial circumstances of municipalities across Ontario

- Increasing training of municipal Integrity Commissioners to enhance consistency of investigations and recommendations across the province
- Allowing municipalities to apply to a member of the judiciary to remove a sitting member if recommended through the report of a municipal Integrity Commissioner

At its most recent meeting on March 24<sup>th</sup>, 2023, the AMO Board reaffirmed its recommendations and additionally recommended that a member removed through application to a judge be prohibited from sitting for election in the term removed and the subsequent term of office.

AMO believes that these changes will improve the working environment of municipal elected and staff officials and send a strong signal regarding the standard of conduct expected. They will also help to protect anyone that may be subject to egregious behaviour and help make municipal government more welcoming while helping residents continue to have the utmost confidence in their local elected officials and institutions. Enacting these changes in the near term will help to ensure our residents can continue to count on their local governments as their closest and most responsive public institutions.

AMO stands ready to work in partnership with your government. Together, we can take strong steps to preserve and improve public confidence in our democracy.

## AMO Policy Update – Helping Homebuyers, Protecting Tenants Plan

Today the Government introduced its latest Housing Supply Action initiative, Helping Homebuyers, Protecting Tenants Plan and its complementary legislation, <u>Bill 97</u>, <u>Helping Homebuyers</u>, <u>Protecting Tenants Act</u>, <u>2023</u>. In addition to tabling legislation, there are approximately 8 associated regulatory proposals open for consultation.

The plan proposes actions to:

1. Protecting tenants and building rentals

With a central focus on improving the rental housing space, AMO is pleased to see that Helping Homebuyers, Protecting Tenants Plan and associated legislation and regulatory proposals that recognizes the full continuum of housing and attempts to make life easier for renters. This work is consistent with to ongoing advocacy from AMO around improving landlord-tenant relations.

#### 2. Helping homebuyers

The Government continues to look at a range of tools to help make homebuying more accessible, including regulatory amendments to help first time homebuyers save for a downpayment, freezing provincial housing development fees, exploring consumer protection opportunities for new home purchases, and continuing advocacy with the federal government.

3. Streamlined provincial land-use planning policy and complementary Planning Act changes

The Government is proposing more changes to the Planning Act, and consulting on a new policy document called the <u>Provincial Planning Statement</u> that combines the Provincial Policy Statement, 2020 and A Place to Grow: Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe. AMO will be reviewing these proposals in more detail as to how these proposals will impact other housing legislation.

#### Direct Responses to Municipal Feedback:

- The legislation responds to municipal concerns regarding the municipal requirement to <u>gradually refund zoning by-law and site plan application fees</u> if they failed to make a decision within specified time periods by proposing to postpone the start date to **July 1, 2023** to give municipalities time to adjust.
- In response to feedback on smaller projects, the proposal also includes the flexibility for municipalities to use <u>site plan control</u> for residential projects with 10 or fewer units in specific circumstances.
- The proposal also intends to address the concerns of municipalities and others have raised regarding the shortage of building inspectors. AMO looks forward to working with the Government as it redesigns on the qualification program and creates modern tools, guidance, and partnerships with key stakeholders in this area.

AMO will continue to review the proposals and update members, as needed.

#### **City of Toronto Audit Update**

On March 29, Toronto City Council adopted the Terms of Reference for the Municipal Bill 23 Audit.

**By July 1:** Provide an independent estimate of the financial impacts of Bill 23 assuming the City would meet/exceed the new housing targets, over the 10-year period, 2022 to 2031. The engagement will ensure modeling assumptions are supportable, probable, and complete.

**By September 30:** Evaluate activities and decisions on investments in growth-related infrastructure (since 2018) scoped around 3 principles:

- 1. Accountability Did the City levy and use municipal development-related charges, such as development charges (DCs) and parkland dedication levies, according to their intended purpose consistent with the DC background study, appropriate legislation and having regard for council direction?
- Effective Did the City follow a prudent process to ensure DC funds collected are appropriately applied against DC eligible growth projects included in the DC Background study?
- 3. *Efficient* Did the City make timely investments in growth-related infrastructure through well-organized project management and administrative processes?

The Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing had also committed to launch a third-party audit of other select municipalities to get a factual understanding of finances, including reserve funds and DC administration. AMO will continue to follow the progress of the work coming from City of Toronto audit and looks forward to more information regarding other municipal audits as it becomes available.

## THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF STRATFORD Resolution: Funding and Support for VIA Rail Service

**WHEREAS** The Corporation of the City of Stratford supports the National Transportation Policy and Section 5 of the *Canada Transportation Act*, S.C. 1996, c. 10 (as amended), which states in part:

"a competitive, economic and efficient national transportation system that meets the highest practicable safety and security standards and contributes to a sustainable environment, makes best use of all modes of transportation at the lowest cost is essential to serve the needs of its users, advance the well-being of Canadians, enable competitiveness and economic growth in both urban and rural areas throughout Canada. Those objectives are achieved when:

- (a) competition and market forces among modes of transportation, are prime agents in providing viable and effective transportation services;
- (b) regulation and strategic public intervention are used to achieve economic, safety, security, environmental or social outcomes
- (c) rates and conditions do not constitute an undue obstacle to the movement of traffic within Canada or to the export of goods from Canada;
- (d) the transportation system is accessible without undue obstacle to the mobility of persons, including persons with disabilities; and
- (e) governments and the private sector work together for an integrated transportation system."

**WHEREAS** the Government of Canada has stated: "we are serious about climate change" and "smart investments in transit help connection communities .... We will continue to work with communities and invest in the infrastructure they need today and into the future";

**WHEREAS** Abacus data has indicated that Canadians are focused on building transit to reduce congestion and connect communities;

**WHEREAS** the Canadian Transport Commission main finding at public hearings in 1977 was that there should be no further reductions to passenger rail services;

**WHEREAS** the frequency of VIA trains running in Canada has been reduced significantly since 1977, causing a subsequent significant drop in ridership;

**WHEREAS** there is a need for balanced transportation with more using transit and less using automobiles;

**WHEREAS** the changing demographic relating to house prices, housing affordability will require further expansions of transit;

**WHEREAS** there is a need to visit tourist sites located along rail lines;

**WHEREAS** the annual cost of congestion to the Greater Toronto Hamilton Area economy alone is between \$7.5 and \$11 billion;

**WHEREAS** there are 10 million more vehicles on the road today than there were in 2000; and

**WHEREAS** the City of Stratford requests the support of this resolution from all communities served by VIA;



## Re: Item for Discussion - School Bus Stop Arm Camera

At its meeting of April 19, 2023, the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Bracebridge ratified motion 23-GC-079, regarding the Item for Discussion - School Bus Stop Arm Camera, as follows:

"WHEREAS almost 824,000 students travel in about 16,000 school vehicles every school day in Ontario and according to the Ministry of Transportation's statistics the rate of vehicles failing to stop for a stopped school buses is over 30,000 times every day;

AND WHEREAS the Province of Ontario passed the Safer School Zones Act in 2017 which authorized the use of Automated School Bus Stop Arm Camera Systems to detect incidents where vehicles failed to stop when the school bus has the stop-arm extended (O. Reg. 424/20);

AND WHEREAS the Association of Municipalities (AMO) working on behalf of all Ontario Municipalities made its submission to the Standing Committee on General Government on May 21, 2019 in support of Administrative Monetary Penalties (AMPs) to be used to collect fine revenue for school bus stop arm infractions and other applications, including Automated Speed Enforcement (ASE) technologies deployed in school and community safety zones;

AND WHEREAS police resources cannot be spread any thinner to enforce additional Highway Traffic Act offences throughout municipalities;

AND WHEREAS the administrative and financial costs to establish the required municipal AMPs program under the Highway Traffic Act, and its regulations, are substantial and maybe out of reach for small or rural municipalities that have insufficient amounts of traffic to generate the required funds to offset the annual operational costs of a municipal AMPs program;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Council of The Corporation of the Town of Bracebridge urges the Provincial Government to:

- 1. Require all school buses to have stop arm cameras installed and paid for by the Province for the start of the 2023-2024 school year; and
- 2. Underwrite the costs for the implementation and ongoing annual costs for Administrative Monetary Penalties in small and rural municipalities;

AND FURTHER THAT this resolution be circulated to Premier Doug Ford, Attorney General Doug Downey, Minister of Education Stephen Lecce, Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry and MPP for Parry Sound-Muskoka Graydon Smith, Provincial opposition parties, AMO, and all municipalities in Ontario."

Your Worship and Members of Council,

We are writing today as we've heard from many of you regarding the introduction of a locate charge, and we'd would like to provide some context and background regarding our approach. We are also seeing a lot of misinformation circulate, resulting in misunderstanding, and we'd like to correct the record.

We, along with **all** underground infrastructure owners, are required to comply with the recently released regulations related to locate delivery (<u>Bill 93</u>). In order to recover our compliance costs and protect the interests of our customers, we introduced a locate charge for **third party and for-profit locate requestors**. We want to reassure you that locates for private property owners and existing natural gas customers **remain at no charge**.

As we shared, the third-party locate charge is currently on pause as we continue to explore pathways and consult with our stakeholders and industry partners, including a phased approach focused on the adoption of a dedicated locator model for large infrastructure owners. Within a dedicated locator model, large excavators hire their own locators trained by infrastructure owners to locate all underground utilities on their projects, which leads to significant efficiencies in locate delivery.

In addition, misinformation is circulating that Enbridge Gas operates its infrastructure in municipal right of ways at no cost – **and this is simply not true**. Enbridge pays more than \$135 million in annual municipal taxes based upon the infrastructure we operate. We also pay additional fees where required when we install new pipe or initiate work to maintain existing assets. We deliver natural gas service to approximately 3.9 million customers in 313 municipalities across Ontario, through a network of 154,000 kilometers of pipeline. We complete approximately 1.2 million locate requests annually. And, in 2023, we will invest \$550 million to maintain and add customers to our natural gas system. We are a proud contributor to the communities in which we operate, and our commitment to the safe, reliable delivery of natural gas underpins everything we do.

We encourage you to call upon the Government of Ontario to enact a dedicated locator model for large infrastructure owners, and to support a phased approach to regulation adoption. Please reach out should you have any questions.
