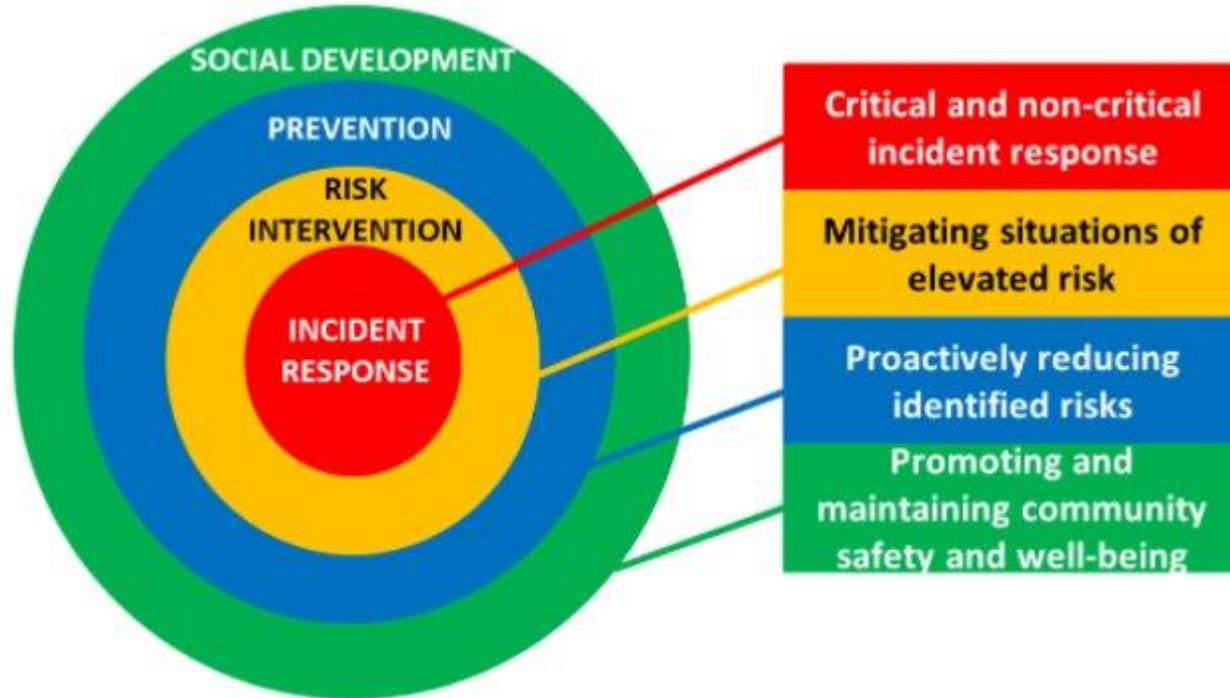

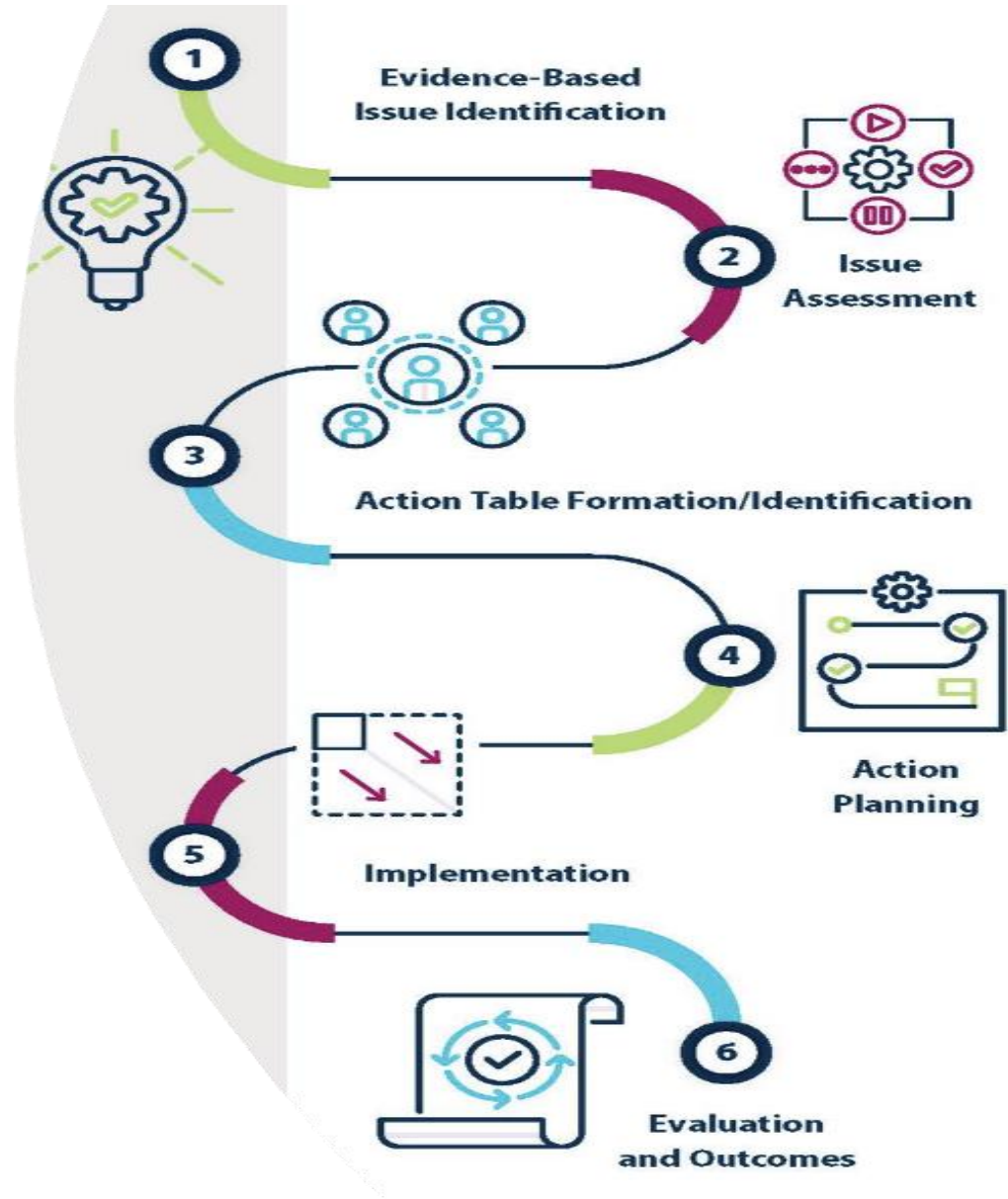

# Crime Prevention:

## Crime Prevention Action Table

- Led by West Grey Police Chief
- Membership from: West Grey police, Hanover police, Owen Sound police, Saugeen Shores police, Neyaashiinigmiing police, Grey Bruce OPP, South Bruce OPP, Victim Services Bruce Grey Perth & Crime Stoppers of Grey Bruce
- Top 4 priorities:
  - Human Trafficking
  - Drug Trafficking
  - Intimate Partner Violence/Gender Based Violence
  - Road Safety



# Housing and Homelessness:

## Homelessness Response Table

- Partners:
  - Grey and Bruce County, YMCA, Safe N Sound Residence, Brightshores Health System, Canadian Mental Health Association of Grey Bruce, M'Wikwedong Indigenous Friendship Centre

### Current work:

- Focusing on enhancing the Grey-Bruce By-Name List
- Implementing a true coordinated access system
- Supporting individuals and families to find and maintain suitable accommodation
- Development of an Encampment Protocol
- Opening of 396 14<sup>th</sup> Street Housing
- Purchase of the short-term housing expansion (713 9<sup>th</sup> Ave)

## Bruce Grey Poverty Task Force

### 2024 Goals

- Increase the number of government partners leading on poverty reduction
- Increase engagement of people with lived/living experience
- Create “income solutions addressing food insecurity” awareness campaign around the release of the Nutritious Food Basket
- Support volunteer recruitment and promote the Grey Bruce Community Volunteer Income Tax Program
- Release the Rentsafe Tenant-Landlord Survey & host a series of engagements with stakeholders

## Mental Health Networking Table

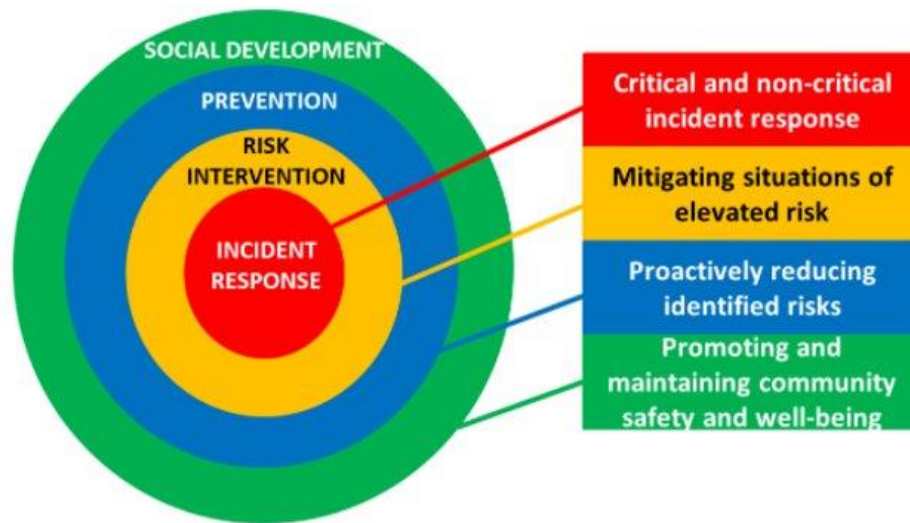

- Currently working with the Grey Bruce OHT to align priorities and goals with the outcomes from the strategic planning day for Mental Health and Addictions held in 2023 by the OHT



# S.T.A.R.

A Situation Table is a meeting of police services, social services, and other community agencies who use their combined expertise to work together to reduce the chance that someone will experience harm from a combination of risk factors that heighten the chances of imminent victimization.

Short-term, immediate, collaborative interventions (within 24-72 hours)



# Acutely Elevated Risk (AER)

AER is a situation negatively affecting the health or safety of an individual, family, group or place where there is a high probability of imminent and significant harm to self or others. The risk factors contributing cut across multiple human service disciplines. AER must be based on the Situation Table's threshold of AER and not individual agency's lens (OACP Standing Committee on Community Safety and Crime Prevention, 2016).

# STAR 2023 Results

- 29 situations were referred, 25/29 (86%) met Acutely Elevated Risk (AER)
- 4/29 (14%) were rejected from the table as they did not meet Acutely Elevated Risk

*68% of situations with AER had their risk lowered in 2023 (17/25)*

- *Conclusion reason: connected to/engaged with services*

# STAR 2023 Example

- Client X called 911 **53 times** in the 2.5 months prior to STAR intervention
  - Police responded to 53/53 situations, estimated cost \$ 12,456.86
  - EMS responded to 9/53 situations, estimated cost \$4,161.60
  - Total Cost: 16,618.46
- 2.5 months following the STAR intervention, Client X called 911 **6 times**
  - Police responded to 6/6 situations, estimated cost of \$1410
  - EMS responded to 0/6 situations, estimated cost of \$0
  - Total Cost: \$1410
- Cost saving of approximately **\$15,208.25** in Police and EMS services
  - 89% reduction in 911 calls (47 less calls)
  - Reduced strain on emergency services
  - Improved connection to supports & services for Client X

## COLLECTIVE IMPACT FRAMEWORK



Our collective impact efforts seek to inform policies and support upstream interventions to address poverty-related community issues. Together we have a common agenda, mutually reinforcing activities, continuous communication and backbone infrastructure.

### Collective Action

The Poverty Task Force is made up of 72+ organizations that work across priority sectors to reinforce activities that contribute to reducing poverty.

### Evidence-informed/best practices

We draw upon local and national best practices; examine and test them in Grey Bruce context.

### Data Driven

We collect local data on social determinants of health, including housing/homelessness, food insecurity, employment and income.

### HOUSING SECURITY

**Release** the Rentsafe Tenant-Landlord Survey and host a series of engagements with stakeholders.

**Create** safe spaces for meaningful exchange to build resiliency, hold space and build collaboration for solutions.

### COMMUNITY VOICES

**Develop** a sustainable funding strategy for the PTF and Community Voices.

**Ensure** the Community Voices group of grounded experts are actively engaged with PTF collective action.

**Increase** municipality leadership engagement with PTF.

### FOOD SECURITY

**Create** income solutions addressing food insecurity awareness campaign during the release of the Nutritious Food Basket.

**Contribute** to the governance, sustainability and promotion of the Grey Bruce Good Food Box.

### INCOME SECURITY

**Support** volunteer recruitment and promotion of the Grey Bruce Community Volunteer Income Tax Program in partnership with CVITP Network partners.

**Contribute** to a Grey Bruce Living Wage Campaign to engage with employers to reduce precarious employment.

### DATA

**Contribute** to participatory data collection and analysis on poverty-related issues such as living wage, CVITP dollar value, housing, precarious work, etc.

**Develop** M&E strategy for reporting against IMPACT Report baseline.

### HEALTH EQUITY

**Contribute** to public education on social determinants of health to reduce stigma.

**Contribute** to navigation pathways supports to SOS Mobile Health Outreach Program.

### TRUTH & RECONCILIATION CALL TO ACTIONS

We shall build better relations . The following OFIFC principles will guide our work:

- Build trust and relations through Indigenous-led Giiwe sharing circles
- Respect Indigenous culture and spiritualities as a foundation for Indigenous identity.
- Understand and respect Indigenous leadership; respond to Indigenous-led community priorities
- Collaborate and co-develop programs with Indigenous communities
- Respect Indigenous Diversity - no pan-Indigenous programming
- Ensure equity for all Indigenous people including women, Two Spirit, Indigi-queer and LGBTQQA+

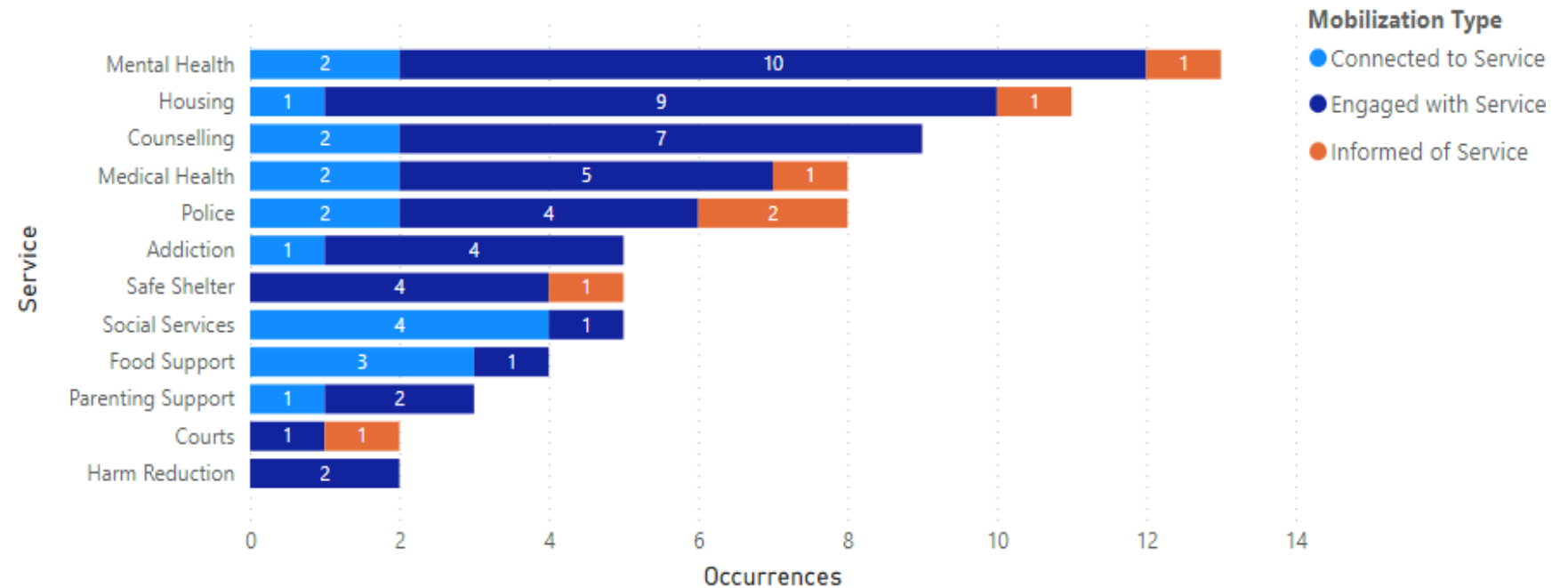

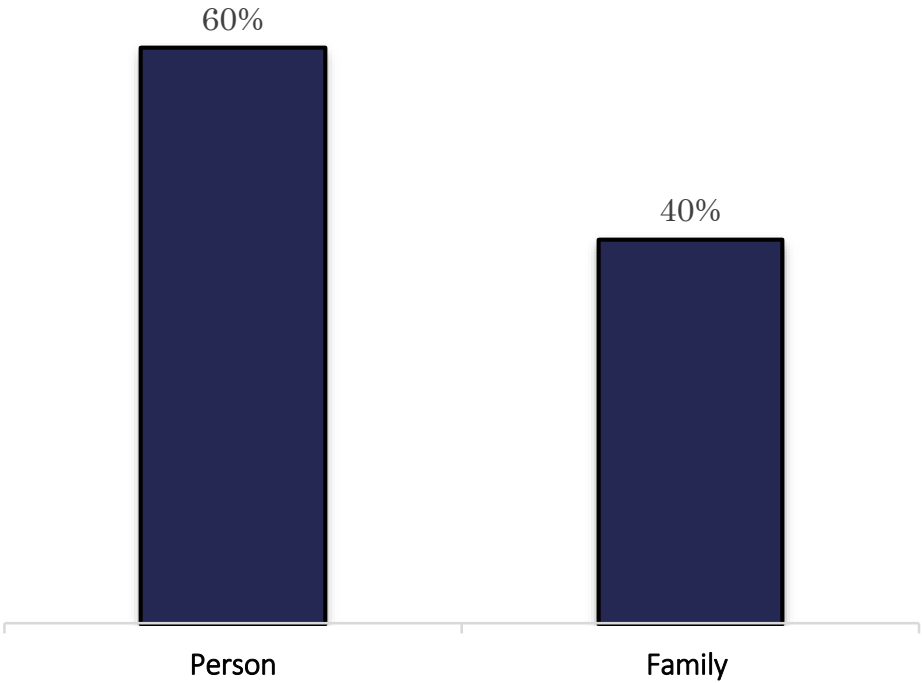

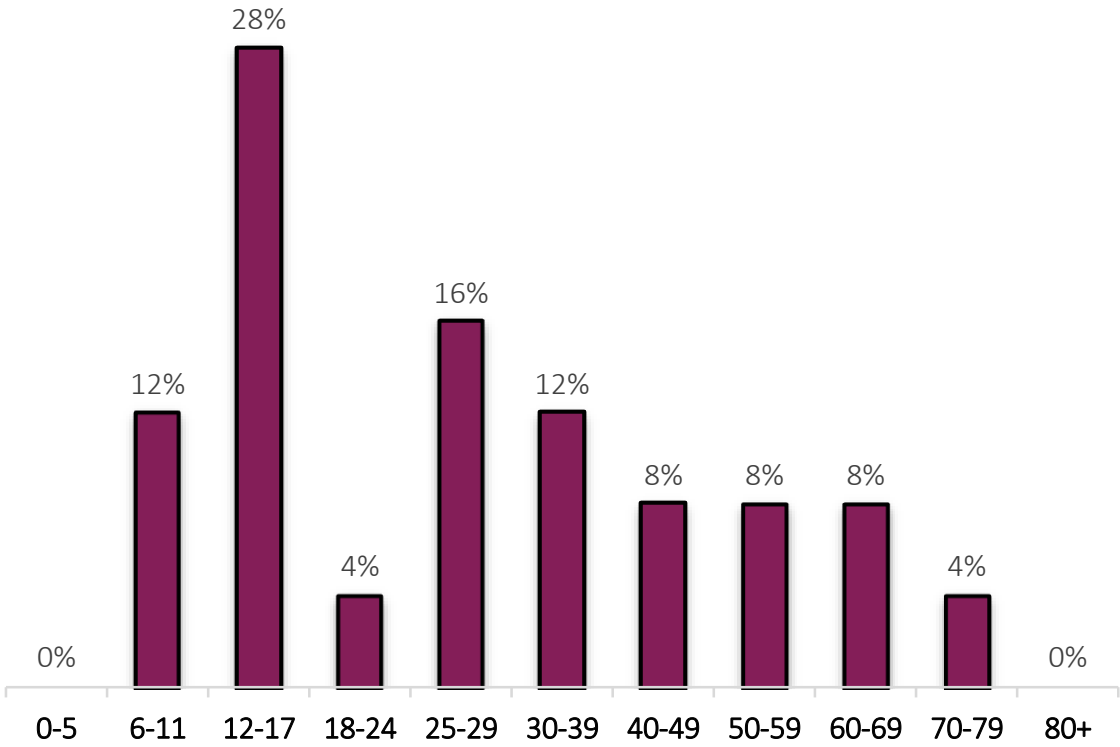

Situation Type

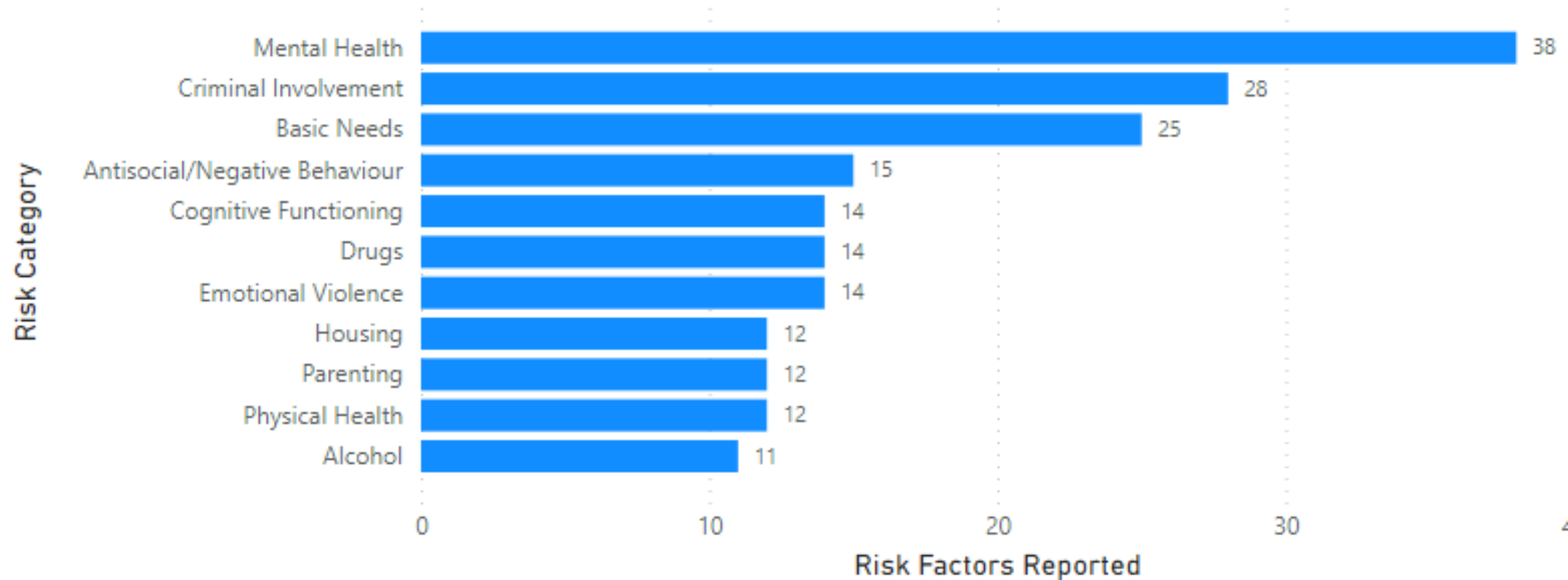


Age
