Dear Energy Stakeholder:

I am writing today to share <u>Ontario's Affordable Energy Future: The Pressing Case for More Power</u>, and to share information about next steps on integrated energy resource planning.

Ontario's energy demand is expected to increase by 75 per cent by 2050, as a result of economic development, housing for its growing population and electrification. There is a need to move to an integrated planning process across fuels and sectors, coordinating the build-out of an energy system that remains affordable, abundant and clean.

To support this work, I am pleased to release *Ontario's Affordable Energy Future: The Pressing Case for More Power*, which sets out our priorities in meeting the challenge of a growing Ontario. We are also initiating a consultation and engagement process that would inform the development of Ontario's first Integrated Energy Resource Plan. This plan, which we intend to release in 2025, will consider a long-term, integrated view of energy use across the economy and across all sources of energy.

To help guide this consultation and engagement process, the ministry has released a consultation posting on the Environmental Registry of Ontario, which includes Ontario's Affordable Energy Future: The Pressing Case for More Power, together with links to contextual and background information and a series of questions to help guide feedback from our consultation and engagement. The ministry is seeking feedback from the public, Indigenous communities, and key stakeholders to help shape the plan, and we would like to hear from you.

On October 23, 2024, I also introduced Bill 214, the *Affordable Energy Act, 2024*, for approval by the legislature. This legislation would, if passed, enable the development of Integrated Energy Resource Plans, and take other steps to achieve our vision of an affordable energy future. The proposal includes statutory amendments that would make it more cost-effective to connect to the electricity grid, help reduce energy use to save families and businesses money and support the growth of electric vehicles in Ontario.

Our legislative initiative, along with *Ontario's Affordable Energy Future*, builds on significant work completed over the past six years to refine energy system planning and guide the transition to cleaner forms of energy. I appreciate the valuable contributions from the sector to help inform this work so far, such as the Electrification and Energy Transition Panel's engagements. I look forward to continuing to work together through this process.

I encourage you to review *Ontario's Affordable Energy Future: The Pressing Case for More Power* as well as <u>Bill 214</u>, the *Affordable Energy Act*, 2024, and submit your feedback through the Environmental Registry of Ontario.

AMO Policy Update - Advocacy on Transportation, Energy and Housing Policy

Responding to Bill.878; Reducing. Gridlock? Saving. You. Time. Act

The Minister of Transportation tabled <u>Bill.878; Reducing.Gridlock?Saving.You.Time.Act</u> that proposes a series of changes to:

- Expedite highway construction for Highway 413, Bradford Bypass, Garden City Skyway Bridge (and future potential priority highway projects) including accelerating property acquisitions and facilitating 24/7 construction, among other measures
- Create a faster environmental assessment process for Highway 413 and the extensions of Highways 410 and 427, and exempt certain nearby early works
- Require municipalities to receive approval from the province before installing new bike lanes that would result in the removal of lanes for traffic
- Freeze fees for driver testing
- Make a Tow Zone Pilot permanent on four sections of 400-series highways in the GTA
- Provide the Minister of Infrastructure with the ability to use an expedited expropriations process for establishing easements that internet service providers require to install and build new broadband infrastructure

AMO will submit comments and seek to speak at Standing Committee to relay the challenges some of the Bill's components create for municipalities. As a start, AMO recently <u>outlined</u> that municipal expertise is best positioned to make decisions on bike

lanes and local transportation planning, and these proposed changes are an overreach into municipal jurisdiction.

In addition to the Bill, the government announced related <u>proposals</u> including plans to consult with municipalities on a new pothole fund for the 2025 construction season. This fund would help small municipalities maintain their roads, which are often difficult to fund due to limited tax bases. AMO will collaborate with the province on the development and rollout of this new fund.

Ontario Announces New Electricity Distribution Funding Legislation

The Minister of Energy and Electrification <u>has announced</u> plans to introduce legislation that would allow the province to regulate electricity distribution infrastructure costs for new homes and businesses. The Minister has also directed the Ontario Energy Board (OEB) to implement recommendations from its <u>Housing Connections Report Back</u> to the Minister which was recently made public.

This proposal would allow distributors to spread the costs of new infrastructure over 40 years instead of 25. It would also require the OEB to review the current practice of collecting upfront costs from early connectors within the first five years and convene a table with municipalities, utilities, and builders to explore ways to reduce the costs of new connections.

This direction aligns with AMO's June <u>submission to the OEB</u>, which advocated for a series of principles to guide funding model changes. In particular, it advances the principle of fairness by ensuring that the upfront costs of new electricity infrastructure are balanced between existing and new residents.

Advancing Advocacy on Energy Procurements

AMO has <u>sent the IESO comments</u> to support the design of the upcoming <u>LT2 Procurement</u> process. Submissions for LT2 projects are expected to be open from December 2024 to Fall 2025, and municipalities are likely to be contacted by proponents seeking municipal support during this time.

Our advocacy stresses the importance of ensuring municipalities have support to make sound local decisions on energy projects and encouraging energy builders to engage early

and often with municipalities. This includes calling on the IESO to ensure LT2 is clear on requirements for project location (including incentives for siting on Crown land and in northern communities), agricultural protection, and Indigenous participation.

AMO has also called for community benefit agreements (CBAs) to become a standard part of energy procurements. This would ensure municipalities receive revenue to offset costs to service energy project sites, and to hire experts to support local energy approvals including energy or legal consultants.

Improving Ontario's Housing Data

Questions and concerns persist on how housing targets are being measured. AMO has worked closely with the province, municipalities and the CMHC to improve data to maximize municipal Building Faster Fund allocations this year. In a recent <u>letter to Minister Calandra</u>, we urged the province to fix 2024 allocations and commit to implementing advice from the sector on how to improve housing data.







AMO Policy Update - Fall Economic Statement

This afternoon, the province released its <u>2024 Fall Economic Statement</u>. The statement included the following announcements impacting municipalities:

- A \$100 million increase in the Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund (OMPF) over the next two fiscal years. AMO welcomes this OMPF enhancement as an important step in addressing municipal fiscal sustainability, including rural and Northern communities who will benefit from this increase. 2025 OMPF allocations, totaling \$550 million, and supporting materials have been posted online.
- Supporting consolidation of **municipal electricity utilities (MEUs)** by extending and expanding transfer tax breaks. AMO welcomes this measure to ease the financial burden when local decisions are made to merge utilities.
- While the provincial property tax review is ongoing, property tax reassessments will continue to be deferred. The province is also undertaking work to permit municipalities to reduce municipal tax rates on affordable rental housing properties, explore property tax changes for student housing, and improve information and data sharing between the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC) and municipalities. AMO looks forward to continued engagement on the property tax review, and these specific measures to ensure that the property tax system continues to work for municipalities.
- Scope expansion on Bill 212: Fighting Gridlock, Saving You Time Act. It now
 proposes to give the province power to remove existing bike lanes. AMO's
 recent policy update on the Bill highlights how the province's overreach into
 municipal planning is ineffective and counterproductive. AMO will oppose this in
 its comments to standing committee.

The province has included stronger revenue and economic growth projections than were included in the 2024 Budget. The provincial fiscal foundations are in place for meaningful partnership with municipalities on a Social and Economic Prosperity Review.

On behalf of municipalities, AMO is calling on the provincial government to make investments that will improve the quality of life of Ontarians in communities across the province. Municipalities need a provincial partner that will:

- Sustainably invest in public infrastructure to support growth, improve transportation, and prepare for the impacts of climate change.
- Reduce the province's \$4 billion reliance on municipal revenues to fund provincial programs, like health and social services, so municipal tax dollars can go toward supporting thriving communities.
- Take action on the root causes of homelessness through investments in mental health and addictions programming and improved income security that allows people to keep a roof over their heads.

Subject: Establishment of an Ontario Rural Road Safety Program

Too many Ontarians are being seriously injured or killed on our roads.

In 2023, there were 616 people killed and 36,090 people injured. The number of fatalities is up nearly 20% in the last ten years.

In 2021, the most recent year of complete data from MTO's Ontario Road Safety Annual Report (ORSAR), there were 561 fatalities – 426 of which occurred on municipal roads. While rural Ontario only represents 17% of the province's population, 55% of these deaths occurred on rural roads. By any measure, Ontario's rural roads are disproportionately more dangerous.

At the same time, municipal insurance premiums continue to increase. With no plausible reform being considered for joint and several liability, municipalities need to find innovative means for managing risk, particularly on their roadways,

To deal with this crisis, Good Roads has designed a multifaceted rural road safety program and have been in discussions with the Ministry of Transportation to fund it. The program would target a municipality's most dangerous roads, perform road safety audits, and install modern safety infrastructure that prevents serious injuries and save lives. This program is designed to be cost effective while also providing rural municipalities with a direct means for addressing risk associated with their roadways.

Good Roads has proposed leading a five-year \$183 million program that leverages our 131 years of municipal road expertise and our industry partnerships to quickly put in place the solutions that will address some of Ontario's most dangerous roads.

Good Roads is seeking support to address these preventable tragedies.

If the Town of The Blue Mountains would be interested in pursuing this, a Council resolution similar to the example below should be adopted and sent to the Premier and the Minister of Transportation:

Affordable Housing Initiatives, Town of Collingwood

In early October, approximately 70 Collingwood residents gathered at Trinity United Church, to participate in a panel discussion addressing the Affordable Housing situation. The evening, part of the church's Trinity Talks series, was moderated by Terry Geddes, a former Mayor of Collingwood. The three panelists were Doug Linton,

Chair of the Collingwood Affordable Housing Task Force, Claire de Souza, Collingwood Housing Development Coordinator and Jack Vanderkooy, Co-Lead of the Institute of Southern Georgian Bay's Social Finance and Affordable Housing Group.

Doug reviewed the work and progress of the task force since 2021, including the creation of the **master plan** https://www.collingwood.ca/affordablehousing. The new mandate given by Council for the year ahead includes community engagement, communication and education related to affordable housing. He challenged the audience to understand all things related to affordable housing and to change the narrative as you discuss these topics with friends to ensure that we are an inclusive community with housing for all.

Claire spoke of initiatives the town has taken to enable more affordable housing. Included is the annual funding of an affordable housing reserve fund, streamlining the planning process, enabling and funding accessory residential units, by-law changes to allow up to 4 units per residential lot, and reduced parking requirements.

Please be advised that the Town of Tillsonburg Council, at its meeting held on October 7, 2024 considered the aforementioned topic and subsequent to discussion, the following was resolved:

Resolution # 2024-474

Please be advised that the Council of the Town of Wasaga Beach, during their October 24, 2024 Council meeting passed the following resolution regarding OPP Detachment Billing Increases.

WHEREAS current police services within the Town of Wasaga Beach (hereinafter referred to as the 'Town') are provided by the Ontario Provincial Police (hereinafter referred to as the 'OPP');

AND WHEREAS the Town and the local OPP detachment have worked in a positive, collaborative and effective manner for decades;

WHEREAS it is apparent that the Ontario Government has overlooked the needs of small rural Ontario; AND WHEREAS Ontario's small rural municipalities face insurmountable challenges to fund both upfront investments and ongoing maintenance of their capital assets including roads, bridges, water/ wastewater and municipally owned buildings including recreational facilities, libraries and other tangible capital assets;

AND WHEREAS small rural Ontario's operating needs consume the majority of property tax revenue sources;

AND WHEREAS small rural municipalities (of 10,000 people or less) are facing monumental infrastructure deficits that cannot be adequately addressed through property tax revenue alone;

AND WHEREAS in 2015 the provincial government moved to standardized billing for all non-contract J.P.P. (5.1) locations;

AND WHEREAS the Ontario Government has committed \$9.1 billion to Toronto alone to assist with operating deficits and the repatriation of the Don Valley and Gardner Expressway; and \$534 million to Ottawa for the repatriation of Hwy 174;

AND WHEREAS the annual cost of the Ontario Provincial Police, Municipal Policing Bureau for small rural non-contract (5.1) municipalities is approximately \$428 million;

AND WHEREAS this annual cost is significantly less than the repatriation costs of the Gardiner Express Way, the Don Valley Parkway and Highway 174 (Ottawa Region) but provides a greater impact to the residents of the Province overall;

AND WHEREAS this will afford relief to small rural municipalities for both infrastructure and operating needs while having a minimal impact on the provincial budget;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT The Municipality of Tweed call on the Ontario Government to immediately implement sustainable funding for small rural municipalities by reabsorbing the cost of the Ontario Provincial Police Force back into the provincial budget with no cost recovery to municipalities;

AND FURTHER, that Council direct staff to circulate this resolution to Premier Doug Ford (premier@ontario.ca), Minister of Solicitor General, Minister of Finance, and to the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (amo@amo.on.ca) and all Municipalities in Ontario.
